LIBERALS WILL HOLD RALLY THIS EVENING AT LAMBETH

Signs Point To Large Attendance at Meeting in Interests of Mr. R. G. Fisher.—Mr. W. G. Charlton Will Speak on the Navy Question

The indications are that there will be a large attendance at tonight's Liberal meeting at Lambeth, where there will be a rally in the interests of Mr. R. G. Fisher. Besides the candidate, other able speakers, including Mr. Jared Vining, Dr. Routledge and Mr. W. G. Charlton, will address the meeting, the latter being the Liberal candidate in East Elgin. He has the reputation of being one of the best speakers in Ontario, and his address on the navy question may be looked forward to with a great amount of interest. Efforts are also being made to have a prominent member of Parliament present, but at the time of going to press the local committee were unable to make a definite announcement. Ladies are invited, and everybody will be made welcome.

CLAIM NO BOAT WAS LOWERED TO SAVE DROWNING YOUTH

Mariners Are Greatly Interested in Suit For \$5,000 Now Being Heard at Fall Assizes in Sarnia—Crippled Father Claims Gross Negligence

[Special to The Advertiser.] Sarnia, Oct. 17.—A sturdy old captain, a crippled father, and a drowned son, are the three intensely interesting elements woven into the suit of Grant Van Valkenburg against the Northern Navigation Company. Charles Van Valkenburg was a deck-hand on the Northern Navigation Company steamer *Hamonic*. He was also the only support of his parents and contributed out of his salary \$20 a month to their support. On May 21 last the young man fell overboard while the *Hamonic* was down-bound across Lake Huron and was drowned. His father is a cripple and unable to do hard work, and claiming negligence on the part of the company causing his son's death, he asks damages amounting to \$5,000. Over the family, it is claimed, hovers the spectre of poverty as a result of the breadwinner being gone.

It is upon Capt. Foote, commander of the *Hamonic*, veteran mariner, and one of the conspicuous figures of the plaintiff are true, Capt. Foote also stands on trial. His license as a master is at stake in the case. The plaintiff claims that the ladder from which young Van Valkenburg fell to his death was not sufficiently protected; that the electric button which signals to the engineer to stop the engines, was out of order; that the steamer did not stop; that no life-boat was lowered.

The company claims on the other hand that as soon as Capt. Foote, who was in his room, was notified, the *Hamonic* swung back in a circle to look for the drowning man. A choppy sea was also running at the time, and in their opinion everything was

done that was possible under the circumstances. The trial took up most of yesterday and is far from completed yet.

Important testimony was that of a deckhand who was an eye-witness to the accident. When asked if he thought everything that could be done to save the drowning man, he declared that in his opinion a boat should have been lowered. Justice Lennox himself asked the witness whether, when Van Valkenburg was seen in the water, he was in a posture that would indicate that he was swimming. The reply was in the affirmative.

The importance of this point is self-evident when it is considered that the plaintiff alleges that no boat was lowered. Mariners are of the opinion that if Capt. Foote did not lower a boat, and so far there is no evidence to show that he did, he has placed himself in a serious position so far as his license as a master is concerned. The trial will likely be finished today.

Was in Charge of Light Brigade

Sir George Wombwell, Last Surviving Officer, Dead in London.

[Canadian Press.] London, Oct. 17.—Sir George Orby Wombwell, the last of the officers who took part in the charge of the Light Brigade at the battle of Balaklava in October, 1854, died today at the age of 81. He was a lieutenant in the Seventeenth Lancers during the Crimean war and in the course of the famous charge two horses were killed under him.

CANADIAN EXPORTS

TOTAL \$130,811,013

Great Britain Took Nearly Half and States Almost as Much.

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—For the four months ended July, 1913, according to a statement issued today, Canada's total exports amounted to \$130,811,013, of which Great Britain took \$59,955,045, and the United States \$52,792,086.

On the other hand Canada imported from Great Britain in the same period to the value of \$45,188,912, and from the United States to the value of \$149,367,823. Of the latter amount, \$54,500,664, or 36 per cent, represents the value of free goods, while from Great Britain free imports totalled \$11,968,054, or 25 per cent. Duty in the four months was \$50,444,081.
