HUN PARTY CHIEFS BREAK OFF COMPACT WITH GOVERNMENT

Withdraw So That They Can Freely Criticise Foreign Policy.

Amsterdam, Aug. 25.—Via London, Aug. 25.—Count Albert Apponyi, leader of the independent party, Count Julius Andrássy, leader of the Constitutionalists, and Stephen Tarkovsky, declared their intention to resume their freedom of criticizing the Hungarian Government in regard to foreign affairs during a debate in the Chamber of Deputies on the Hungarian foreign policy, says a dispatch from Budapest. They also announced their withdrawal from the arrangement whereby they took upon themselves the duty of inquiring into questions of foreign policy as representatives of their parties and in return received confidential Government information which enabled the parties to keep in touch with foreign affairs.

Confidence in Apponyi.

Count Apponyi, in making his declaration, said that if the Entente Allies concluded from the action of the Hungarian Opposition that the moral unity of the Hungarian nation had been shaken in any way, their illusion could only cause amusement. The Opposition, he said, viewed the military situation with confidence and readily acquiesced in the appointment of Marshal Votaw Hindenburg to the command of the greater part of the Austro-Hungarian army in the eastern war theatre. Count Andrássy made a similar declaration, and claimed that questions of importance relating to foreign affairs should be dealt with publicly in Parliament.

Premier Tisza said he regretted the withdrawal of the Opposition leaders from the arrangement and believed some erroneous conception had led them to take the step. The confidential information given the leaders, he asserted, was much more extensive than that which could be given publicly. With reference to the policy of the Dual Monarchy toward Italy, the premier said, that negotiations with that country prior to the war had put their self-esteem to a severe test.

The parliamentary situation, the dispatch adds, has made it impossible for delegations of two parties to meet. The Hungarian Parliament now, however, is in a deadlock in respect to the election of the Government, all the constitutional functions regularly exercised by the delegations of the parties.

INQUEST TONIGHT.—The inquest into the death of Charles Herbert of Denfield will be held this evening at 8 o'clock in the police station. Herbert was struck by a street car at the corner of Dundas and Richmond street on Tuesday night. He had placed his hand on a northbound car, and passing around the rear of it stepped directly in the path of the southbound Normal. His injuries were at first thought to be light, but he died at 11:30 in Victoria Hospital the same evening.

the pincers on Ginchey and Guillemont.

This afternoon they pressed forward another lap towards the trench and observers witnessed another artillery curtain of fire, which utterly silenced the German machine guns as the British caught picked its way among shell craters for 100 yards up a hillside, entered the German trench and sent back the usual bunches of German prisoners.

British never falter.

All was clear at last on a stage and viewed from a gallery even to the detail of men standing on the edge of the trench and throwing bombs as they might toss biscuits into the back of the enemy, reaching the very top of the ridge at one point for a front of one thousand yards.

Close to Thiepval.

They were within only five hundred yards of the pulverized remains of what once was the village of Thiepval, which has become the most redoubtable of names to hundreds of thousands of men.

Meanwhile the British kept on sending 15-inch shells into the German capital area and into the German douguts which lie deep under the wreckage of houses. Spouts of smoke and dust rose to the height of 200 feet, and what looked like the bodies of men or sections of timbers were tossed about.

SENATOR FROST DEAD

Died Suddenly at His Residence in Smith's Falls.

Ottawa, Aug. 25.—Hon. Senator F. T. Frost, died suddenly at his residence in Smith's Falls this morning. He was in his 73rd year. He had sustained a stroke of paralysis about six months ago. He was apparently in good health when he retired last night.

Senator Frost's death leaves another Liberal vacancy in the Upper House.

ENGLAND IS CALLED SPECIAL ENEMY BY GERMAN EXTREMISTS

Say Poland and Belgium Must Be German Bulwarks After the War.

Berlin, Aug. 24.—Via London, Aug. 25.—A proclamation containing views on the peace conditions which might be imposed by Germany is published today by "the independent committee for a German peace," an organization formed some time ago by those considered to be the extreme war advocates in Germany. The proclamation asserts that, despite the fact that the Germans and their Allies are holding three kingdoms in their hands, the Entente still talks of the destruction of the German Empire.

England a Special Foe.

"Our enemies will not succeed," continues the proclamation. "One thing they have accomplished is to force upon us the realization that England is our special and most dangerous enemy. England causes our enemies to stick to the war. England leads them. Upon England they depend for their victory and more after the war. On the wreckage of our empire, England hopes to unfurl the banner of Anglo-Saxon world domination."

The document asserts that Russian territory from the Baltic to Volynia must in the future be included in the German sphere, to serve as a bulwark against the Russian tendency to annihilate Germany. France's revenge ideas must constantly be kept in mind, so that in the west also changes would be necessary.

Belgium's Fate.

Belgium in the future, adds the proclamation, either will be a German or an English bulwark, so "real guarantees" here also are needed.

The document then cites the expression of Dr. Peter Stauder, leader of the Catholic party in Reichstag, that "Belgium must be in German hands militarily, economically and politically."

The proclamation concludes with the assertion: "England's plan threatens us with political and economical helotry. It aims at our life as a people and as a nation. It aims at our culture and institutions. Energy must be applied regardless of consequences to force peace upon this enemy. Let it not come true that, as England says, we will win all the victories England will win the war. With Von Hindenburg, let us say it, it is not only a question of sticking it out, but of winning."

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
