CUTS TAX RATE THIRD OF MILL

Commissioners Reduce Estimates of Victoria Hospital by \$18,000.

REFUSE SALARY INCREASE

Advanced Cost of City Lighting Adds \$2,881 to Expenditures of No. 1 Committee.

The city commission, on Thursday hight, got the tax rate down nearly a third of a mill by paring off \$18, 000 on the hospital account and \$1, 300 on the board of health estimates and eliminating \$4,000 from the police estimates for a new patrol. Cut By \$1,300.

London Branch Association Hears of Niagara Marketing Experiment.

MADE USE OF TELEPHONE

Members of Organization Received Shipping Directions Every Morning.

Members of the London branch of he Ontario Fruit Growers' Association heard an interesting and com-prehensive report on the work accomplished by the Niagara Peninsula Growers in 1921, their maiden year as a co-operative selling organization, by David Elliott, B.S.A., a member of the sales force, in the office of the department of agriculture here,

Mr. Elliott reviewed conditions which led to the growers organizing, stating that in 1920 only two-thirds of a \$5,000,000 crop had been marketed. The same year, \$32,000,000 worth of fruit was imported from the United States, showing that it was a lack of proper marketing facilities Frank Stover, oil driller, with four one-third of the Niagara fruit went to waste.

Limit Shares To Five

Mr. Elliott next explained that no grower could hold more than five shares. A small grower held one share in the association and the larger the acreage under fruit the more shares could be held. All the profits went back to the grower, the

The association started with 456 members, and while half the growers of the district were not members the larger fruit men were and this meant that over \$1,500,000 worth of fruit had been disposed of by the association in its first year.

The district was divided into 13 divisions, each under a director. From 8 till 10 a.m. each day during various districts was called over the telephone and asked for an estimate of his day's picking.
