MAJOR PARTIES FIND LIBERALS IN ASCENDANCY

Battle Waged by Premier Norris Has Depleted Ranks of Farmers.

FUSION LOOMS CERTAIN

Conservatives Assured Of Third Place in Election On Tuesday.

Special to London Advertiser. Winnipeg, Man., July 14 .- Manitoba is again on the verge of electing a coalition Legislature. With three major parties, Liberals Farmers and Conservatives, endeav-

oring to gain control of the Legisnd the remote possibility of any of them doing so, the last days of a three-months election campaign finds political seers already speculating as to the possibilities of a fusion between the Liberals and Farmers following the elections.

When the Norris government was defeated on the floor of the Legislature last March indications were then that the United Farmers of Manitoba would sweep the country.

Four cabinet ministers announced withdrawal from public life, and Premier Norris, along with his chief lieutenant, Hon. C. D. McPherson, minister of public works, was practically to face the Farmer tide

A provincial convention of Lbierals was called by the Dominion Liberal Association, and Norris was indorsed as provincial leader.

Since that time the premier, along with old-time Liberals, have been making an intense battle for suprem acy at the polls, and the result has been that the support which the farmers had reckoned on obtaining has been transferred to the Liberal party.

An accurate forecast as to the out-come of the elections in Manitoba yesterday is somewhat hazardous, owing to the many three-cornered fights and the appearance of new parties into the field. Indications, however, are the United Farmers Manitoba and the Winnipeg wing of the organization, the Progressives will return the largest group to the Legislature, with the Liberal party second in strength, Conservatives third in voting power, with Labor a

Anarchist Fires Three Times At Carriage of Police Prefect of Paris.

ESCAPES FATAL BEATING

Paris, July 14 .- Considerable excitement was caused during the reurn of the presidential cortege from the military review at Longchamps, when an unidentified man fired three times at the carriage of Armand Naudin, police prefect of Paris, which was preceeding the carriage of President Millerand.

The assassin, who was about 20 years old, and appeared demented, was arrested after having been beaten badly by the crowds

He was found to be Gustav Bouvet, an anarchist, well-known to the po-lice, and shot in the belief that it was President Millerand at whom he was aiming. None of the shots took

effect. The dense crowd around was at first terrified by the shots. Then it turned upon the man who had fired them, and he was being beaten to death by the enraged spectators when the police came up and seized
