**CHARGE BROKERS WITH CONSPIRACY**  
Four Prominent Toronto and Montreal Stockmen Arrested.

Toronto, Nov. 15.—Charged with conspiracy to defraud their clients, four prominent Toronto and Montreal stock brokers, former members of the Toronto Stock Exchange and the Chicago Stock Exchange, were placed under arrest today.  
Those held are Adin E. Bryant, Toronto, who was taken into custody here by local detectives, and Norris P. Bryant, his brother; Chester G. Fickett and Andrew Dunn, who were arrested in Montreal by Toronto and Montreal detectives. All the prisoners were members of the firm of Bryant & Isard, who assigned last spring, and who, before the assignment, had offices in the C. P. R. building here, and on Frances Xavier street, Montreal.  
The amount said to be involved in the alleged conspiracy is approximately \$500,000. Adin Bryant, who was locked up in Court street station, was later released on \$10,000 bail. The other prisoners are now on their way to Toronto, where the trial will be held.

Will Sing in Winter Gardens Tonight, Entire Jenny Lind Program.

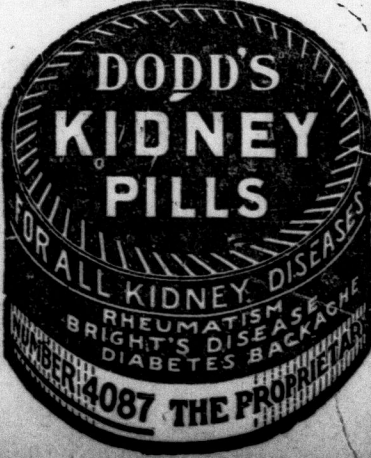

**WATERLOO MAN TAKES OWN LIFE**

Postmaster George Diebel Hangs Self—Believed To Have Been Insane.

Waterloo, Nov. 15.—Insanity is now given as the motive behind the suicide this morning of George Diebel, postmaster and former mayor of the town of Waterloo. His body was found hanging from a beam in the lavatory at the top-story of the postoffice. The man seemed to be in the best of spirits at 7 o'clock this morning, being the first one on the job. Shortly before 8 o'clock he stated he would step out for a moment, and in the lavatory, hanging from the small end of a clothesline.  
The news of Mr. Diebel's tragic end was received with shock throughout the Twin City community. He was long identified with the development of Waterloo, having for years been one of the most prominent merchants of the town. On Tuesday night he was re-elected vice-president of the Kitchener-Waterloo Hospital, and attended the meeting of the board. None of his business or board conferences were aware of anything troubling the popular postmaster.  
It is stated that a slight irregularity on the part of one of his subordinates worried him and preyed on his mind. His brother under similar worries, some years ago, ended his life in a tragic manner.  
Coroner Honsberger, after viewing the remains and investigating the circumstances, decided that an inquest would be unnecessary, as there had been a taint of insanity in the man's family. Mr. Diebel was 72 years old, and leaves a widow and one grandchild. He was president of the Ontario Mutual Fire Insurance Company.

**BRANTFORD M. H. O. PRESENTS REPORT**

Brisk Rate Evidenced the Highest in Period of Seven Years.

Brantford, Nov. 15.—Medical Health Officer Dr. W. Hutton submitted his report for the year ending Oct. 31, 1922, upon the sanitary and health condition of the city of Brantford. In his statement he said that the birth rate was 26 per thousand, which is the highest in the last seven years, and the death rate was 12 per thousand.  
As regards the infant mortality, he reported 63 deaths per thousand babies born, and gave a report on the value of the work that was being done in the different lines by the baby clinic and nurses of the Social Service League, the school medical service and the Victorian Order of Nurses. He reported the city as practically free from scarlet fever and diphtheria. His report on tuberculosis showed 47 cases, the largest number ever reported, and the report on typhoid fever showed that only eight cases were reported through the year.  
Several cases of smallpox have appeared in the city within the past few days, and the health authorities are taking every precaution to prevent a spreading of the disease. All of the cases are those where the patient had not been vaccinated. Every effort is being made by the medical officer of health to see that all those affected are placed in quarantine, and measures have been taken to prevent any further spread of the disease.

**CHARGE VETERAN WITH STEALING TWO CATTLE**

Charles Stobie Will Appear at General Sessions at Walkerton, December 12.

Lion's Head, Nov. 15.—Charles Stobie, a returned soldier, who lost an arm in the war, and who has been farming near the village of Mar, in the Township of Albemarle, has been sent up for trial by Magistrate McFarlane, on a charge of stealing two head of cattle from J. H. White, who resides on lot 13, con. 3, E. B. R.  
The nature of the charge was considered to be too serious to permit of summary trial of the accused, so he will be tried at the general sessions of the peace at Walkerton on Dec. 12. Stobie is out \$500 bail, provided by two neighbors.  
When White missed the cattle recently, he reported the matter to the authorities, and the cattle were traced to the G. T. R. cattle yards at Walkerton, where they had been taken on Oct. 20. White had taken the precaution to pierce the left ear of one of the animals, and in the right ear of the other was a tag bearing the initials of the owner.  
Richard Crane, a cattle dealer, claimed to have purchased the animals for \$70. White and others placed the value of the cattle at \$120.  
Reports from the Bruce peninsula state that cattle rustling is not an uncommon occurrence. There are few fences in some sections of the peninsula, and when cattle wander away they are not easily traced. J. H. White, who laid the information against Stobie, claims to have lost no less than eight head of cattle this year, and other farmers have been missing cattle, of which no trace could be found.

**OBJECTS TO CHIEF BROADENING OUT**

Blenheim Council Orders Official To Confine His Duties To Town.

Blenheim, Nov. 15.—At the regular meeting of the town council, held last evening, the matter of the chief of police, who also is chief engineer of the fire department, acting as a county constable, came in for a considerable amount of debate, and final decision that the chief must confine his duties to the town work and let the county work go.  
Reeve Clunis brought up the matter, and fathered a resolution, which was supported by Councillor McPherson, to notify the chief to resign as a county constable or resign as chief engineer of the fire department of the town. Both members held that there was too much at stake to allow the chief to go out of town on county constable work, and they urged that the resolution be carried. They had nothing against the chief and held he was a good officer, but they had not hired him for town or county work, and in fact, county work interfered with his town work, and was taking too much of his attention and time.  
Councillors Shillington and Ferguson, while agreeing that the chief's duty was to attend to the town business, and especially as engineer of the fire department, they thought it better to leave the matter with the police committee to ask him to resign as county constable, and so moved an amendment to leave the matter in that way. This amendment carried. It came up in the discussion that the chief had been recently appointed, and that in the face of the reeve's objection. No member seemed to know just who was responsible for the appointment, and Reeve Clunis was considerably annoyed when he learned that the appointment had been made.
