A RAILWAY DISASTER. Two Men Killed and a Large Number Injured.

Conneilsville, October 19.-A most disastrous wreck, in which two men were quite seriously, occurred to-day near Conuence, Pa., on the Confluence & Oakland Railroad, a new line to connect with the Baltimore & Ohio at that place. This morning a construction train started out with 200 laborers who were to work at a point not far from Confluence. Engineer William Thornley was pushing his train at a slow rate of speed when a car in the front jumped the track. The second car contained two men, the foreman and a negro laborer. In the next car were about 100 men, and the third car was loaded with rails. When the first car jumped the past three; services at three o'clock. Friends track the third car crashed into the two front ones and the others piled on top of them. The two men in the second car. Foreman James Fitzpatrick, of Wilming on, Del., and James Williams, colored, of Shakesville, Pa., were crushed to death and horribly mangled. Most of the laborers in the second car miraculously escaped. only three being injured seriously, although a large number sustained slight cuts and bruises. Of the seriously injured, internally and one leg broken in three places. J. W. Tierney and Brakeman Ira stearn had their legs broken and were otherwise injured, but will recover. The

cause of the accident is not yet known.

Killed at a Railway Crossing. Napanee, Ont., Oct. 20.—This morning about four o'clock the switchman of the Grand Trunk Railway found a man about 25 years old dead on the track at the crossing about 200 yards west of the station. He was identified as Russel Toplet, school teacher, Collins' Bay. It is supposed he tried to jump on an east-bound train and was drawn under the cars.

The Cortes will assemble as soon as he takes the oath of

allegiance. King Luis was the second son of Queen Maria II., and was the second sovereign of M. Koechlin, the engineer of the Eiffel Portugal of the line of Braganza-Coburg. He was born October 31, 1838, and sucbrother, King Pedro V., November 11, 1861. He married, October 6, 1862, Pia, youngest daughter of Victor Emmanuel, King of Italy, by whom he had two sons, Carlos, born September 28, 1863, and Alfonso, born July 31, 1865. King Louis was of a literary turn, and in 1877 published a translation into Portuguese of Shakespeare's "Hamlet." This was followed in 1880 by a translation of "The Merchant of Venice," and later by an excellent translation of "Richard III."
