WHAT IS GOING ON IN SPORTING CIRCLES ALL THE WORLD OVER.

Fulljames' Challenge to Gilmore—Hanan Going to Return Without Visiting Australia—Muldoo's Encounter with His Landlady.

Ten American stallions were winners on the English turf last year. Fulljames, the pugilist, owns thirty-two dogs of thirty-two different breeds.

Lorillard has 35 horses in training for next season. Twenty-two are 2-year-olds. The case trotting stable won \$23,515 last year. The larger part was won by Jay-Eye-See.

The next championship lawn tennis tournament of England will be held at Wimbledon on July 5, 1894.

It is stated that Hanan has definitely decided not to go to Australia, but will return north early in February.

Princess in each of her three races at New Orleans is described as running like a deer and holding the lead throughout.

S. D. Phillips of the New York Athletic club, will go to Montreal to skate there on the 12th instant. He recently skated a quarter of a mile in 43.2-5 seconds.

The boxing match in Albert hall this evening between Hurst and Gilmore held fair to prove exciting. A large audience is expected. Both men are in superb condition.

John A. Goldsmith, the driver of Director, headed the list of winning drivers last year with \$18,050 credited to his skill. John S. Campbell, driver of Richball, was second, with \$17,000 to his credit.

George Lorillard raced 15 horses last season and won \$47,533, of which Monitor captured \$12,675 by winning eight races out of the 19 that he started in. Aella ran 23 times, won ten, and landed \$8,845 in cash.

A very extraordinary thing occurred at the New Orleans races. Horses that ran as 2-year-olds on one day ran next as 3-year-olds. In fact between the two days' races all the horses advanced a year in age.

Four rinks of the Brampton curling club visited Toronto yesterday and played matches against the Granite and Moss Park clubs. The visitors were successful in each contest, defeating Moss Park by 76 to 60 and the Granite by 67 to 63.

Speaking of Mr. Batchelor, the present owner of the Canadian bred Princess, the New Orleans Times-Democrat says he must have had his best colors made by the best maker in the city. They are among the prettiest on the track and are always to be seen in front.

Fulljames and Gilmore. A challenge was recently received from George Fulljames, light weight pugilist, to Harry Gilmore, to fight within six weeks for \$500 a side, or within three months from signing articles for from \$1000 to \$2500 a side. The day following Gilmore accepted the first challenge and notified Fulljames to that effect, the result being in Fulljames' going immediately in training.

In an interview at New York Fulljames said that he was in the best of health, and that he proposed to start for Toronto on the 10th inst. They fight at 124 lbs. weight, and although now turning the scales at 122 lbs., Fulljames said he could easily reduce the surplus weight to the amount the articles called for.
