How the Singular Deal Was Made. A sister of Miss Bond, Mrs. George Rindling, who resides in Princess-street, let the wedding be postponed originally for Feb. 8, and the supper was prepared and everything in shape for the wedding, but Mrs. Rindling failed to show up.

Mrs. Rindling continued: "Give me a writing about the stuff in the house if it belongs to Sarah," said my husband. And Mr. Martin said, "I'll do that." He then sat down and wrote the paper you talk of. No, there is no damage to him.

Other Matrimonial Engagements. The other young ladies to whom the curate engaged himself were Miss E. Kitchener and Miss Delmage, and in the houses of the parents of these estimable young ladies every preparation had been made for the wedding, the date arranged with Miss Kitchener being Feb. 16 and with Miss Delmage Feb. 16.

Martin began paying his attentions to Miss Kitchener about a year and a half ago, and for the past six or nine months has been most persistent in his attentions, having during that time called upon her daily.

He invariably waited for and escorted her home from church on Sunday, and on Saturday night last (the 13th) he called at the curate's residence, and was present when she had her choir girls—two not expecting to see them again that evening.
