GOOD-BYE TO LAMBTONS 149 Change in Name of O. A. C. No.

Big Day of Sports at Sarnia. Lambtons 149 is now preparing to say good-bye to the county, instruc-

tions for mobilization being under way. The Battalicn was authorized on November 26th, 1915, and after six months of strenuous recruiting it is nearly up to strength. Great credit is due the County for its generous response to the call for men and money. Recruiting officers were stationed at some thirteen points in the county, and the men as they enlisted were billeted and trained at local centres-a plan which has produced splendid results.

The men as a whole are a splendid body of troops, a credit to any district, men of whom Lambton may well feel proud, and who may be depended upon to give a good account of themselves on all occasions at home or abroad.

Plans are now being made for mobilization at Sarnia. In this connection a grand military field day will be held, crammed full of special features. Something to interest everyone is being carefully planned. This will be the Battalion's official farewell to the county and all citizens should try to be present for the occasion to show their appreciation of the brave

boys who are offering their services in defence of honor and liberty. The following are a few of the events for which arrangements have been made :---Grand Military Parade (149th Bn. Bands, Decorated Autos, etc.), Baseball, Football, Races and

Field Sports, Boxing, Wrestling, Ex-hibition Drills by a Bayonet Fighting and Physical Training class. Every possible arrangement is be

ing made to make May 27th one of the biggest and most memorable days in the history of the county.

Sunday morning at 9.30 the Batt alion will parade to Victoria Park where a special service will be held at which all churches will be represented. Music will be furnished by the Battalion Band and massed choirs from the city churches.

At the Ontario Agricultural College for each of nine years in succession the O. A. C. No. 72 variety of oats has surpassed the Banner in yield per acre and in quality of grain. It has made the best record of over three hundred varieties obtained from various parts of the world, and which have been tested out at Guelph for hve years or more.

years or more. A member of the firm of L. P. Gunson years or more. A member of the firm of L. P. Gunson & Co., of New York State, visited the College, saw the O. A. C. No. 72 oats growing in the experimental plots, se-cured our reports, ascertained the source of seed, and early in 1915 bought six hundred bushels, at \$1.40 per bushel, from a farmer living within ten miles of the Ontario Agricultural College. We have just learned that the name "O. A. C. No. 72" has been changed to "Im-perial", that the College records have been appropriated, and that the reported yield has been increased about six per fcent, as the standard weight per bushel cent., as the standard weight per bushel of oats in the United States is 32 instead of 34 pounds. These oats, under the name of Imperial, have been advertised anne of Imperial, have been advertised extensively in catalogue form, and num-erous agents have been travelling from farm to farm over Ontario and elsewhere during the spring of 1916 selling this re-named variety of oats for \$3.18, and up-wards, per bushel. The oats were ad-vertised in exactly the same way by L. P Gunson & Co., and by Geo. K. Hig-bie & Co., also of New York State, whose catalogues appear to be identical except in title pages. First class seed of the O. A. C. No. 72 variety of oats can now be purchased in abundance from Ontario farmers at \$1.00


