PLAN TO CHANGE CLIMATE

Based on their calculations on the
effect of the Gulf Stream on the
climate of Great Britain, engineers
are now planning to block the Straits
of Belleisle and thus transform East-
ern Canada into a winter resort riv-
alling Florida or California, says a
contemporary.

British capitalists have asked for
a concession to build a railway from
Quebec to Newfoundland. In order
to complete the road, a bridge across
the Strait separating Labrador and
Newfoundland is necessary. Engin-
eers have reported that the plan is
feasible and are now seriously con-
sidering the question of constructing
a great dam instead of a bridge. It
would be ten miles long and fifty
feet wide, and the estimated cost is
only ten million dollars.

Scientists claim that blocking this
outlet for the cold Arctic currents
flowing into the Gulf of St. Law-
rence would have amazing effects on
the climate of Eastern Newfoundland,
Quebec, P. E. Island, New Brun-
swick, Nova Scotia and the New Eng-
land States.

It would be difficult to over-
estimate the benefits of such a scheme
if it is possible to control the ocean
currents. Population would increase,
new cities would spring up, a verita-
ble new world would speedily de-
velop in Eastern Canada.

Truly it is a mighty "if." Engineers
have not had much practice in jugg-
ling with ocean currents, but in view
of all the once impossible achieve-
ments which are now common-place,
it is not entirely incredible.

FORESTS AND GAME ACT PRO- VISIONS

At the last session of the Legisla-
ture the laws for the protection of
Forests from fire and the Game Laws
were consolidated and united in one
Act, called the Forests and Game Act.
Instead of a Board of Game Com-
missioners, there is now a Commis-
sioner of Forests and Game. The
work of the forest rangers and that
of the game wardens are now under
the supervision of one officer. By
co-operation between the forest rang-
ers and game officers better protec-
tion should be afforded to both for-
ests and game. Among the impor-
tant changes made in the game laws
since the last season are the follow-
ing:

Partridge—(ruffed grouse)—There
will be an open season for birch
partridge from October 15th, to No-
vember 15th.
Wild Ducks—By amendment of the
regulations made by the Dominion
Government under the Migratory
Birds Treaty the open season for
wild ducks and geese is now from
October 15th to January 31st, except
in the County of Cumberland, where
the open season is from September
15th to December 31st, as it was last
year.

Hares—The open season for hares
(or rabbits) has been lengthened, ex-
tending now from November 1st to
March 1st.

Fur-bearing Animals—The season
for trapping is now from November
15th to January 15th.
Licenses—Residents of the Provin-
ce hunting big-game are required
to take out a license costing \$2.00.
One license covers both moose and
deer. Trappers are also required to
take out licenses. A trapper's license
costs \$1.00, but license entitling the
holder to set not more than eight
traps is issued without fee. The fee
for a non-resident's license covering
all game has been increased from \$30
to \$40.

Hunting Licenses can be obtained
at the office of the Commissioner of
from Municipal Clerks, Game War-
dens and other Agents throughout
the Province having them for sale.
Royalties ranging from 3 cents on
weasels to \$2.00 on silver fox are
payable on the skins of fur-bearing
animals taken within the Province.

GRENADEA STORM

Steps Taken To Relieve Poor In
Great Hurricane Last Week
St. Vincent, Windward Islands, Sept.
15—Expeditious for the relief
of the poor who lost food crops and
houses in the great storm which
swept over St. Vincent last week have
been approved by the legislature. The
Government plans to import food-
stuffs and lumber for distribution of
the needy.
The storm damage on the neigh-
boring island of Grenada is placed, on
moderate estimates, at \$500,000. Nut-
meg and cocoa plantations which
were ruined will require at least
seven years for re-establishment.
On the Grenadine group of islands,
between St. Vincent and Grenada, the
food crops and houses of the settlers
were almost completely destroyed.
The first shipment of relief sup-
plies has already been forwarded to
the islands.

HEAVY DEATH TOLL IN TEXAS FLOODS

San Antonio, Texas, Sept. 14—
Floods claimed from 100 to 150 vic-
tims in south central Texas Friday
night and Saturday, exclusive of the
forty-nine known to be dead in San
Antonio, according to special despat-
ches received to-day.
Practically all the messages told
the same story that the majority of
drowned and missing were Mexicans,
many of them farm laborers, living
in the lowlands along the San Gabriel,
Brazos, Colorado and Little Rivers.
Property loss, principally to crops,
was estimated at six million dollars
to ten million dollars.

HOME-MADE MARBLES

Every boy knows the ordinary
kinds of marbles, and no boy ever
has all he wants of any kind. Though
ordinary commercial marbles are
made of many different substances,
including glass, clay and marble, it
will be news to most boys that beau-
tiful and otherwise satisfactory mar-
bles can be made at home from salt
and starch. Put three cupfuls of
fine salt into a basin, set it in the
oven and leave it there until it is
hot. To one cupful of starch add a
cupful of lukewarm water and stir
the two together. When the salt is
sizzling hot, mix the starch with it
and when it is cool enough knead it
with the hands until it is smooth
and springy. Then roll out the mar-
bles with the hands and leave them
on a tin in the warm oven to dry
and harden for twenty-four hours.
