## Mr. W. T. James Re-elected Mayor of Hamilton.

Mr. W. T. James, of Hamilton, Bermuda, who is a resident of a Bridgetown suburb for half the year has been re-elected mayor of Hamilton for his third term. Mr. James has a wide circle of friends and acquaintances here who will join The Monitor in extending congratulations. The following excerpt is from the Bermuda Royal Gazette:—  
"More than usual interest was manifested in the election of a mayor, aldermen and common council for the corporation of the City of Hamilton on Wednesday. The result of the poll was a thorough and complete endorsement on the part of the freeholders of the policy of the retiring Corporation all of whom were returned. The voting took place, as usual in the City Hall. When the time arrived for counting the votes a process which occupied an hour and a half the building was inconveniently crowded.  
The result of the election which was announced by the Returning Officer, Mr. C. Butterfield, was received with considerable applause. The newly elected Mayor immediately rose from his seat and addressed the meeting at considerable length.  
From the mayor's introductory remarks we quote the following:—  
"The Mayor elect said speech-making was not his forte and that evening he had not been able to prepare a speech for the reason that he did not know on which side he would have to talk. He thought he might have had to make a retiring speech and that would have been very different to a speech of victory. He wished to thank the freeholders of the City of Hamilton for the confidence in him. Public opinion, they would find, seldom if ever made mistakes and the election had, he took it, been an illustration of that. He thought both sides had put forth their best efforts, and the result of the election had demonstrated beyond a question that public opinion had upheld the old Corporation in the position it had taken."
