G. F. S. NOTES.

The evening of April 27th found about 70 members and associates of the Girl's Friendly Society with a few friends assembled in the basement of St. George's Church, for their Annual |

Meeting. When the reports were read it was found that the Society numbered 68 members and associates, that regular monthly meetings had been held with one exception, and that in addition weekly or monthly meetings had been held in the four parishes interested. An effort is being made to provide the furnishings for a cot in the Children's Hospital, and for this purpose \$10,26 has already been given in small sums by the members, towards the \$20.00 required. The election of officers proved an easy matter and Mrs. Tilton, President; Miss Thompson, Vice-President; and Miss Wicksteed, Secretary-Treasurer, were reelected. A short programme followed, sweetened but not entirely interrupted, by the introduction of coffee and cake, and containing a slight sketch of the needs and work of the Children's Hospital, written by Miss Stone, who was unable to be present. Kind words of advice and encouragement were given by the Chaplain and the Rev. Mr. Mackay, of which, perhaps, will be best remembered the new parable. "The kingdom of heaven is a ship with no accommodation for passengers all must be workers," and with a note of praise the "annual" was over. A vote of thanks to the Rector and churchwardens of St. George's for the use of the schoolroom was subsequently passed at the Associates Meeting. The members made their corporate communion at St. John's Church on the following Sunday morning, when they were addressed by the Chaplain.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

The 8th annual meeting of this society was held in St. Alban's schoolroom on April 11th, and proved to be one of the most interesting and hopeful on record. Encouraging addresses were given in the morning, at the celebration of Holy Communion in the church, by the Rev. J. J. Bogert, and in the afternoon by the Rev. H. H. Tudor of Winnipeg, and by the Rev. F. R. Smith of Hull. The Ven. Archdeacon occupied the chair, and several of the city clergy were present. The reports showed an increase of membership, which is now 263, but the average attendance at the regular monthly meeting was found to be rather out of proportion to the membership.

The amount collected by fees and offertory was \$232.34, of which only \$26.70 was required for postage, printing, freight, etc., and the remainder has been used directly for missionary purposes, the largest sum, \$100.00 having been given towards the salary of a lady missionary to the Piegan Indians. Sixteen bales have been sent away to missions in Algoma, and the North West. The new material in these bales was valued at \$133.76. The report of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary, which includes all the parishes but St. George's, showed a membership of 32, regular monthly meetings held, and several sets of "fair linen" and one stole, made
