

ing in great difficulty upon the all important Third Point—no means so indicated, that although the demands of the Allies has been much modified, the Russian Plenipotentiary had referred to the matter to St. Petersburg. Nothing further could be done until a reply was received. The French Minister of Foreign Affairs had also been in London to confer with the English Cabinet upon this momentous question.

COMMERCIAL INTELLIGENCE.—In the Liverpool Cotton Market, an active speculative demand existed, and a buoyant tone prevailed. Sales of the week about £200,000, of which nearly one-third was taken by speculators and exporters. Breadstuffs, with the exception of Indian Corn, had undergone a slight decline, and a general dullness prevailed in the market. Provisions were somewhat depressed, and quotations rather lower than those by the Balm. London Money Market easier, and Consols show a slight advance.

THE CANADA ARRIVED AT LIVERPOOL. 7 P.M., Thursday 9th. The Washington sailed from Southampton, Wednesday the 28th.

VIENNA CONFERENCE. The Washington carries intelligence that the first of the four bases of peace mentioned by the late Mr. Webster, and the second was proceeding favorably. Since then the second has likewise been accepted; but difficulties of a serious nature have occurred in the third. The Western Powers, foreseeing trouble, did not propose demilitarization of Schastopol, but modified their demands into a reduction of Russian power in the Black Sea; in recompense for that they offer to evacuate Russian territory. Russian plenipotentiaries reply that they are not authorized to accede to any such terms, and must remit the matter to St. Petersburg. Here the conference stands still. All the plenipotentiaries have sent to their governments for instructions, and the conference will probably be adjourned until a final authority shall arrive. Meantime the 4th point is under discussion. Prince Gortschakoff, on the 26th, moved for the admission of Prussia.

SEBASTOPOL.—The special correspondence of the London "Times" says—condition of army improved—health and spirits of troops better—provisions abundant—sanitary regulations strictly enforced, but the actual works of siege made no progress to justify favorable prophecies.—There is but little exertion on both sides, and there has been no comparative advantage gained by the allies.

A formidable Russian force is assembled around Eupatoria, and virtually besieges the place.

On the 14th the Turkish cavalry made a sortie from the town, but were driven back.

The Russians could not hold Eupatoria if taken, as it is completely under the guns of the English fleet.

English latest despatches assume a steady fire, without change in the aspect of affairs; important operations are however going on.

The Russians continue to strengthen their works, but part of an advance line of defence is consequently indisposable for the allies to destroy.

Nightly encounters take place between the French and Russian riflemen; the latter have been repeatedly dislodged, but again returned to the pits, under cover of batteries.

PRINCIPALITIES.—Reports have arrived of a French division for Bessarabia. Muslay is named as its place of concentration. The Russian Gullina is occupied by a strong Russian garrison.

Exportation of corn from Bessarabia is prohibited.

ASIANIC COAST.—The British steam-frigate Piper destroyed on March 8th the martello tower and battery at Pylmilla, which the Russians recently constructed for defence of their coast between Anapa and Kerick.

The Viper, from 200 yards, burned Guineiros and took two guns.

The Circassians menaced by land the batteries at Sato.

The British steam-frigate Leopard, acting in concert with the Circassians, shelled Sonjick-rall, but the Circassians had fallen to attack by land as promised by their chiefs. The ships dismounted the bombardment. The Circassians however returned, burned a small fort at the head of Sinjak bay.

CONSTANTINOPLE.—The treaty of alliance between Russia and Turkey is signed.

The death of Meschikoff was stated by Paris papers but denied by other papers.

It was stated that the allies had assented to a truce.

A manifesto of the Synod of the Russian Church has appeared inciting the war in defence of the faith.

No loss of life occurred in the recent burning of the French hospital at Constantinople.

The Parliament has discussed in committee, showing that England will loan money at five per cent, and lend to Russia at six per cent.

The Rubicon committee continues in session. Medical officers were being examined.

The inquiry for papers connected with Admiral Dundas's conduct before Odessa was required by the Commons.

Lord Palmerston remarked that there was no part of Admiral Dundas's conduct but did him honor.

The Earl of Leacon's conduct was discussed in the House of Commons on motion to grant him a court martial. Earl Leacon's gallantry was acknowledged, but the court martial was refused.

A motion is on the books for the appointment of a commission for the amalgamation of the Western and Indian armies, or at least to render the Indian army available in the European war. And a notice of motion asks if it is intended to nominate any more Bishops for Canada, since the Canadian Clergy Reserves Bill says it is desirable to remove all connection between Church and State.

Parliament adjourned over Easter holidays till April 16th.

Nine ships of the advanced British squadron sailed from Deal the 28th March, for the Baltic. Mr. Buchanan attended a dinner at Seaman's Hospital, London, on Monday last for the aid rendered to 1600 sick American soldiers—Palmerston presided.

The circular further taxes Austria with dissimulation in threatening Prussia with military danger, while the rest of Europe talks confidently.

BREADSTUFFS.—Brokers circulars report very moderate business in wheat at 1d to 2d lower. Flour sold to fair extent, in retail rd reduced. Indian Corn in good request for Ireland; mixed and yellow and white, easier.

COX'S and other circulars—Breadstuffs tending downward. Western Cornal flour 4s 11d, 3s 8d @ 3s; Baltimore and Philadelphia old, 4s 10d @ 4s; do new, 3s 6d @ 3s; Ohio, nominally 3s 8d @ 4s. White Wheat 11s 6d @ 12s 3d; red and mixed, 10s 8d; mixed 10s 9d. Mixed Corn, 4s 4d @ 4s 2d @ 4s.

LIVERPOOL PROVISIONS.—Beef and Pork depressed. Bacon quiet, 1s lower. Hams in better demand; 2s @ 30s for pots; 30s @ 31s for plain. Exchange lower, but no export of gold. No change of Bondrates. Bullion increased £10,000 sterling.

Liverpool freights quiet and dull.

THE NAVAL BUIELET BEFORE SEBASTOPOL.—A measure of justice is likely to be done to the naval brigade, which has so bravely performed its part in the siege of Sebastopol. The Admiralty, in consequence of the gallantry and good conduct displayed by the officers serving in that brigade, have directed that the following promotions shall be made—Three Commanders to Captains in better Commandants; Commandants; thirteen Mates, six Assistant-Mates, two clerks.

The Earl of Clare has given directions to an eminent sculptor for a monument to be erected in the parish church of Mount Shannon, to the memory of his eldest son, the late Lord Fitzwilliam, of the 8th Husars, who fell at the battle of Alma.

THE ANNUAL EXAMINATIONS of the year 1855, will be held at two periods—viz. in June, commencing on the 4th day of the month, and in September, commencing on the 24th day of the month. At the first of these periods, Students in Arts of the standing of one, two, or three years from Matriculation, and Candidates for the degree of B. A., are required to present themselves.

The following Scholarships will then be offered for competition: viz.

1. Amongst Students of the standing of one year from Matriculation—15 of the value of £30 0s. 0d. each.
2. Amongst Students of the standing of two years from Matriculation—15 of the value of £30 0s. 0d. each.
3. Amongst Students of the standing of three years from Matriculation—15 of the value of £30 0s. 0d. each.

At the second of these periods, Candidates for admission in Law, Medicine, Arts, Civil Engineering, or Agriculture; Undergraduates and Candidates for Degrees in Law and Medicine; Students of the standing of one or two years from Matriculation, and Candidates for Diplomas, in Civil Engineering, or Agriculture, are required to present themselves.

The following Scholarships will then be offered for competition, viz:

1. Amongst Candidates for admission: In Law, seven of the value of £30 per annum each. (Three amongst Candidates for admission in Law and Arts simultaneously, who purpose entering on a course of study in Law, extending over five years; and four amongst Candidates for admission in Law and Arts simultaneously, and Bachelors of Arts, who purpose entering on a course of study in Law, extending over three years.)
2. In Medicine, three of the value of £30 per annum each.
3. In Arts, fifteen of the value of £30 per annum each.
4. In Civil Engineering, three of the value of £30 per annum each.
5. In Agriculture, three of the value of £30 per annum each.

Each of the Scholarships, established in this University, is tenable for one year, but the Scholars of each year are eligible for the Scholarships of the succeeding year.

Graduates or Undergraduates of any University in her Majesty's dominions, are admissible ad eundem, but are required to produce satisfactory Certificates of good conduct, and of their standing in their respective Universities.

Attendance on Lectures is not required, as a qualification by this University, except for Students in Medicine. Candidates, who purpose presenting themselves for Examination at either of the above mentioned periods, are required to transmit the necessary Certificates to the Registrar, at his office in the Parliament Buildings, at least 14 days before the first day of Examination. 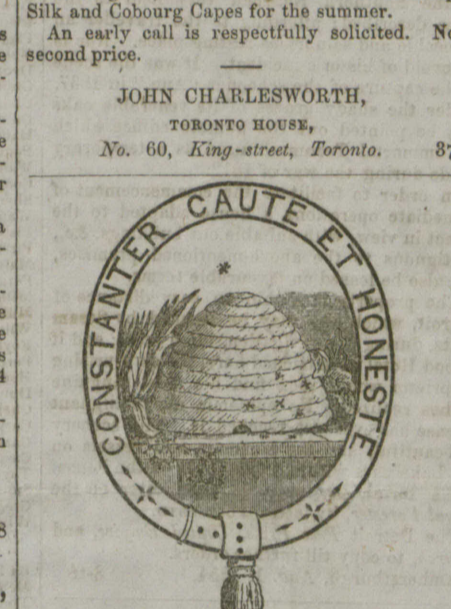
