EL SALVADOR—GOVERNMENT'S TREATMENT OF CHURCH REPRESENTATIVES

Mr. Dan Heap (Spadina): Mr. Speaker, the Government of Napoleon Duarte in El Salvador continues to lose credibility and support. It is now attacking church figures, including even the Archbishop, by accusing his organization of funnelling money to the FMLN. A prisoner of the Treasury Police has also denounced an Episcopalian priest, a pastor of the Lutheran Church, an administrator in the Lutheran Church, an official of the Baptist Church, and a program worker of the Roman Catholic Diocese.

The indications are that many of Duarte's colleagues will use aid money from other countries such as Canada to build bases for themselves in the next elections when Duarte is no longer considered a viable candidate.

SOUTH AFRICA—IMPOSITION OF STATE OF EMERGENCY

Right Hon. John N. Turner (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Deputy Prime Minister in the

absence of the Prime Minister and the Secretary of State for External Affairs. It has to do with the rapidly deteriorating situation in South Africa. He knows, and the Prime Minister knows, that there is now a state of emergency there. One thousand political prisoners are being held, there are riots, and they have press censorship. That regime is offending humanity and what is happening in South Africa demands a response, I believe, from this country.

My question is the same question that Bishop Tutu is asking. When is the world going to act? My question to the Deputy Prime Minister, and through him to the Prime Minister of our country, is when is Canada going to act?

Hon. Erik Nielsen (Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of National Defence): Mr. Speaker, Canada has taken a leadership role in acting with respect to the South African situation.

Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Nielsen: Announcements to that end were made last July and they were made again in the House yesterday by the Secretary of State for External Affairs. He also discussed frankly with the House the wide range of options that were still left and would be pursued by Canada if necessary.
