

# Golf All Americans Out of British Tourney

## PHENOMENAL GOLF PUT OUT CHIC EVANS

Last of Americans Succumbed Before Two Scotchmen, Who Lost in Next Round.

SANDWICH, May 21.—Charles W. Evans of Chicago and Harold Weber of Toledo, the two survivors of the ten American competitors in the British amateur golf championship, were eliminated in the fourth round today, and as a consequence there is much jubilation among the followers of the British players.

Two or three times in the course of a lifetime every good golfer seems inspired and puts up a phenomenal game. That is what C. B. MacFarlane, a Scotch player, did today in his match with Evans. He played better golf than he ever did before and his 31 for the first nine holes broke all previous records for the course.

There was no fault to find with the game as played by the ex-western open champion, but he was not inspired, and his defeat was inevitable. MacFarlane was five up at the turn and he won four up and three to go.

In the game between Harold Weber and Captain Cecil K. Hutchinson of the Royal and Ancient Club, St. Andrews, the Scotchman played better and steadier golf and won on his merits by six up and four to play.

No man plays a phenomenal game twice in succession, and there was no much surprise when the conqueror of Evans was himself defeated in the fifth round. Hutchinson, the holder of the British championship, was put out of the contest in the fourth round by Edward Blackwell, St. Andrews.

Another interesting result of the contest today was the elimination of H. S. R. Tubbs of Littlestone, who yesterday defeated Francis Guinness, American open champion.
