SUCCESSION OF COLONELS.

Lordship in Sicily, secured the independence of that island. A Sicilian Parliament was assembled in 1812, and a government having been established in the island, Lord William Bentinck proceeded with a body of troops to Spain, and landed them in Catalonia. In January, 1813, he was removed to the ELEVENTH Light Dragoons. He returned to Sicily in October, 1813, and in 1814, he left that island with a body of troops, and at Leghorn he published a proclamation, inviting the Italians to shake off the French yoke. He subsequently landed his troops, and, after a few slight actions, made himself master of Genoa. At the close of the war he resided some time at Rome. In 1825 he was promoted to the rank of general; he was also rewarded with the dignity of Knight Grand Cross of the Order of the Bath, and Knight Grand Cross of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order; and in 1827 he was appointed Governor-General of India, having been previously sworn a member of the Privy Council. He was nominated commander-in-chief of the army in India in 1833; he returned to England in 1837. He died at Paris, in June, 1839.
