A CANADIAN POPE

Rumor That Archbishop Bruchesi Will Be Made Cardinal With This Aim.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—A person in close touch with the highest officials of the Roman Catholic Church in Canada says that influences are now at work looking to the creation of a Canadian cardinal, with the ultimate end in view of finally securing for him the highest office of the church—namely, that of Supreme Pontiff.

It is stated that the man in view is Monsignor Bruchesi of Montreal, a cardinal, who are members of the council charged with the election of a new Pope, was present at the Eucharistic Congress in Montreal last September. It is stated that Monsignor Bruchesi's relations with them were of the most intimate and confidential character, and that they took back with them to Rome very liberal personal subscriptions from him, totaling about \$100,000, and including gifts of \$25,000 to Cardinal Vannutelli, and of \$25,000 to Cardinal Merry del Val, the papal secretary, whose voice is most influential in the College of Cardinals.

THAT CASE OF CHOLERA

Said to Have Landed at Quebec and Gone Thru to Wisconsin.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—When the report that a Russian named Gottlieb Jenschke, had traveled from Europe by way of Canada to a point in Wisconsin and had there developed indications of cholera, was brought to the attention of Dr. Montanari, the director-general of public health, he said that it was the first he had heard of the matter. He had had no information from the state board of health of Wisconsin, and if such a case had developed the first thing that body would have done would be to send him a telegram asking for information.

QUEBEC, Dec. 1.—Immigration authorities of Quebec believe that a continuation of names must have caused the story about cholera in Wisconsin. The Wisconsin dispatch mentions Gottlieb Jenschke and the name of the Russian immigrant suffering from cholera who arrived here by liner on Nov. 16 is Belde Gottlieb, and this immigrant in still held at the quarantine hospital at Chesebrough Island. His destination is Acacia, Wis.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., Dec. 1.—Local authorities know nothing of the cholera case that is said to have gone thru here.

U. S. SCHOONER FOUNDERED

Crew of Seven Safe on Board Steamer British Sun.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The steamer British Sun, from Port Arthur, Texas, Nov. 10, for Portland, passed the Lizard tonight, and signalled: "Have the crew of the American schooner Cox and Green of Boston aboard. She carried a crew of seven and an infant." Newburyport, Mass., in 1889.

WILL NOT HANG

Death Sentence on Robert Parker Commuted to Life Imprisonment.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—(Special.)—The death sentence passed upon Robert Parker, who was found guilty at Belleville on Oct. 8 of murdering William Masters on April 8, was this afternoon commuted to imprisonment for life.

HEAD OF LAKES TO SEA

Passenger Service Projected From Port Arthur to Montreal.

PORT ARTHUR, Dec. 1.—(Special.)—It is said that the Merchants' Mutual S. S. Line will operate a steamboat passenger service between Port Arthur and Montreal next year, in connection with the Canadian Northern Atlantic service. The trip would not be a time-saver, but would be popular with tourists, and advantageous to immigrants coming out by the Royal steamers, with whom a couple of days' difference would not be material.

NO RATE WAR

New York Central Yields to Ultimatum of Competing Roads.

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Final action on New York to Chicago passenger rates was taken here to-day at a conference of the interested roads. The Erie, the Grand Trunk and the Wash served notice that, unless the Pennsylvania and the New York Central abandoned the differential rates which they have hitherto granted via the Pan-Handle and the Michigan Central routes, a rate war would be declared.

The threat was not only frank, but specific. According to information here the threatened cut in first-class passenger traffic to Chicago was as low as 38, and in second-class as low as 25. In addition the rate to Boston was to be cut, the new tariff to be filled forthwith, unless an adjustment was reached.

In the face of such an ultimatum, the Pennsylvania and the New York Central decided to yield, and after the conference adjourned, announcement was made that the rates had been made uniform.

Want St. Charles Dredged.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—The Quebec board of trade sent a deputation to Ottawa to-day to ask for the dredging of the St. Charles River and transfer of marine headquarters from its present site to the St. Charles River.

The construction of a wharf and new buildings were also sought. Consideration was promised.

A CLEVER SWINDLE

BRANDON, Man., Dec. 1.—(Special.)—A cleverly worked swindle for apparently small gains has been worked here. A Frenchman, giving the name of J. L. Riopol, arrived here recently, representing himself as of the "inland revenue department of mines," and said he was to superintend the rebuilding of the insane asylum. He bought a million feet of lumber, contracted for a number of engines and apparatus, and also a steam boiler, paying with cheques on the Bank of Montreal.

Riopol was welcomed, wine and dined, but one man, writing the Bank of Montreal, was answered: "Cheques no good. Beware of this man."

Riopol, who claimed Sir Frederick Gordon for his father-in-law, cannot be found to-day. He probably is ahead by small loans and entertainments.
