RAISE STANDARD OF INDIANS Methodist Mission Board Favors Special Schools in Alberta,

Special Schools in Alberts.

The third session of the general board of Methodist missions was held yesterday in Cariton-street Methodist Church, with Rev. Dr. A. D. Crown in the chair. The board decided to ask the government to give more protection among the indians from intemperance and immorality, and will urge that government officials be appointed to hook after this work. They also urge the government to build three Indian schools in Alberta, with a home for boys in Fort Simpson.

Rev. C. C. Farrell delivered the report of the Indian Educational Commission, showing that there were twenty missionaries in Ontario and Quebec, at an average cost of \$52.55 to the board. The total membership of the schools was 2025.

The report of the Japan Educational Commission was given by H. H. Fudger. J. W. Flavelle gave the report on Asiatic work in Canada.

At the morning aersion Rev. Geo. Steele, was appointed the secretary of the journels, with Dr. Young to assist him.

Rev. Mr. Hyckman was appointed chairman of the committee on home missions, and Thos. Hilliard secretary. The foreign missions committee returned Dr. Heanty chairman and C. B. Keenlyside secretary.

The total receipts of the board, as given in Treasurer Fudger's report, amounted to \$652.191.96, the expenditures amounting to \$658,250.33. The liabilities and assets were \$7.713.78 and \$31,924.12, respectively. It was decided to use the sum of \$1500 for cases of affliction.
