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There should be a chief consideration of such property as we now have, and the making of a most important study, in order that, as necessity arises it may be modified to meet the changing conditions of a constantly changing country.

As to labor, the first essential is employment and plenty of it with good wages. The protection of our industries is the best policy for us, as for capital during the critical period of the development of our country—changing and the building up of industries.

**Better Roads.**

After all, it is the people who make the property of the country. The duty of the government is to provide the national highways, and to aid in the development and trade of their country. I am not against immigration to the farming district which made it. The national policy, by bringing up our home industries, has benefited not only of the immigrants, but of the entire community.

Here the lesson of the census is important. City population is increasing, and the country population is almost standing still. The city of Canada must depend upon production of the farm more than ever before. Farmers must seek to make life attractive, to give the people all possible advantages, to facilitate production. And we must have a good government. It is a great market for the producer and the farmer of the WEST. THE INTERESTS, THE NEEDS OF THE WEST ARE THE SAME AS BORE IN MIND. Anything do to promote its settlement, to help its resources, to assist in its production to the best advantage of the people of the whole of Canada. That is one of the questions to which the government must address itself.

As to every other plank in the platform of the candidates for the HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, IN THE PRESENT CAMPAIGN, THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF REAL ESTATE BROKERS HAS A MOST MISTAKEN POLICY.
