Cheese Toast, With Bacon. This dish may be made of any variety of bread, but it is particularly good when made of Boston brown bread. While the bread is being toasted melt two level tablespoonfuls of butter; cook in it one and one-half tablespoonfuls of flour and one-fourth a teaspoonful each of salt and paprika;
