HELPING VETERANS WITHOUT CAPITAL

Major Ashton of Land Settlement Board Confers With York County District.

GETTING ORGANIZED

Those Who Have Land But No Seed Will Be Helped First.

Major Ashton, one of the members of the land settlement board, was in Toronto yesterday in connection with the work of the board, and presented the case of the board before the executive of the York County and District division of the G.W.V.A. The major is now on his way back to the west, and stated to a reporter for The World that the board was now directly considering the cases of those men who owned farms but had not sufficient capital to seed and harvest them this year.

"For three weeks we have been working very hard," said the major, "and before much can be accomplished very short organization must be the first consideration."

"Is it true that the government is considering the advisability of expropriating many millions of acres of land now owned by the vested interests?" asked the reporter.

"There is no legislation in force which could be considered as favorable to such a policy," replied Major Ashton.

"Do you believe the government has such legislation in view?"

"Ah, that is not within my province to say."

Major Ashton stated that while it was true that he was interested in an undertaking concerning an Lloydminster, his real work was with the municipality, and that he was secretary of both the school board and of the hospital board.

Ten Years in Militia.

"I served ten years in the Canadian militia, specifically with the 2nd and Saskatchewan Light Horse, and during the course of field service in the South African campaign I gained my three stripes," said the major. "I was a militia officer in Canada when the great war broke out, and on Jan. 15 I joined the 32nd Battalion and went over to France with it. We landed in France in May, 1915, and were divided into the 2nd, 5th, 8th and 10th Battalions. I myself was sent along with the 10th Battalion, and Major Yates, a great friend of mine, was with the 32nd in the 2nd Battalion, and finally, I believe its second in command."

When Major Ashton returned from the battlefields of South Africa, he homesteaded in western Canada, at Lashburn, Sask. His family is well-known in the Saskatoon-Lincolnshire district of England, and he was born on a farm.

In conclusion, the major stated that while the men with no seed were present the first consideration of the government, the interests of those who wished to take up land would soon be looked after from Frank Score, president of the Y.M.C.A., last night on "Street Car Advertising." DEFAULTERS TAKEN AT GAYETY MATINEE

Over One Hundred Found by Dominion Police Without Military Papers.

GO TO HEADQUARTERS

Marched Thru Streets to Building at Foot of Yonge Street.

Dominion police, over 25 strong, under command of Captain Tom Flanagan, carried the campaign for rounding up draft defaulters to the Gayety Theatre yesterday afternoon and did business on a big scale. The work of inspecting the military papers of the men in the theatre audience started right after the conclusion of the matinee. When the last curtain came, Lieut. Noble, of Capt. Flanagan's headquarters staff, spoke from the stage and informed the audience of the work the Dominion police had on hand. The women and children were permitted to leave, then all exits being watched, except the two main doors, the police waited until the police were finally taken to the street on their proper military papers being shown.

Over a hundred of the men theatre-goers had failed to carry their military credentials and were instructed to remain inside the lobby. These men were finally taken to the Dominion police headquarters in the old board of trade building, Yonge and Front streets. They marched in a body via Sheppard, Adelaide, Bay, Wellington, and Yonge streets. Those that could arrange over the phone for the bringing of their papers to the police were given a chance to do so and then permitted to go. The others were bound over to re-appear this morning with their papers at headquarters.

On Friday morning a squad of Dominion police, and six civil police, under Inspector Fugue and Sergt. Lyndall, of Park Avenue station, searched three houses on Carleton avenue, north of Danforth, for three alleged draft defaulters. Their searches failed to result in the apprehension of the men sought for.

ALBERTA NOW EXCEEDS PACIFIC MINING COAL

Railway Development Has Made Available Vast Resources, and Province is Now Second Only to Nova Scotia.

The abnormally cold weather during the winter, and the difficulties experienced in securing fuel, has intensified interest in the coal resources of the Dominion. Many people, for the first time are searching statistics to ascertain, as exactly as possible, the extent, value and location of the coal resources of the nine federated provinces.

For many years Nova Scotia has been the premier coal-producing province, and until the last few years British Columbia was second in the list. But, railway construction has rendered available a considerable portion of the vast extent of the coal resources of Alberta, and that province, on the eastern slope of the Rockies, has ousted the Pacific Coast province as the coal producer of Canada. The greater part of this recent expansion in production of coal in Alberta has been brought about by the building of lines of the Canadian Northern Railway.

The production in tons: Nova Scotia, Alberta, Brit. Col. 1909 5,652,089 1,994,741 2,606,127 12,252,957
A study of the tonnage carried by the Canadian Northern during the last few years shows that its development as a coal carrier has been almost entirely due to closer settlement in the prairie provinces, and to the extension of the coal mines along its lines in Alberta.

The important position Alberta has occupied in the building up of million tons of coal handled over its lines.

The production of coal in that province was but \$1,146 tons. In 1911 it grew to 294,780 tons; in 1914 to 358,729; in 1915 to 476,460; in 1916 to 706,414; and in 1917 (eight months only of the year being shown) the figures had already attained to 851,281 tons.
