A study of the tonnage carried by the Canadian Northern during the last few years shows that its development as a coal carrier has been almost entirely due coal carrier has been almost entirely due to closer settlement in the prairie provinces, and to the expansion of the coal mines along its lines in Alberta.

In 1910, the Canadian Northern carried in coal only 282,718, and, in 1912, 804,803 tons. By 1914 the total handlings had doubled, the figures being 1,724,337, and, for its annual report as of June 30, 1917, it is understood the company will show a total production of nearly two million tons of coal handled over its lines.

The important position Alberta has occupied in the building up of this tonnage may be gathered from the fact that in 1910 the movement over its lines in that province was but 81,146 tons. In 1911 it grew to 204,730 tons, in 1914 to 358,739, in 1915 to 476,860, in 1916 to 706,414, and in 1918 (eight months only of the year being shown) the figures had already attained to 691,261 tons.


