RAILWAY BOARD DECIDES HERKIMER-STREET CASE

Company Must Relay Rails and Leave the Devil Strip at Four Feet.

HAMILTON, Sept. 13.—(Special.)—In regard to the condition of Herkimer-street, trouble has for some time existed between the corporation of the City of Hamilton and the Hamilton Street Railway Company, and this matter has become the subject of the judgments of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board. On July 5 last the board ordered that the old rails be removed from this street between Queen and Locke-streets, and the tracks be properly re-laid with suitable rails upon sound ties before Oct. 1 next. The Street Railway Company re-laid this portion of their track, but the manner in which the work was done led to further litigation by the city, which made complaint before the board. The company, in relaying this portion of their track, had widened the devil-strip from 4 to 5 feet, and raised the height of the rails several inches above the grade of the street, while the space between the rails and for two feet outside had not been properly filled. The city engineer had previously furnished the board with a profile showing the grade, but nothing on the profile justified the company, in the opinion of the board, in widening the devil-strip. This profile was evidently prepared on the assumption that no change was to be made in the width of the devil-strip, and also its width was not expressly stated in by-law No. 624, passed on March 23, 1892, nor in the accompanying agreement of the same date. It was clearly not the intention of the City of Hamilton, in the opinion of the board, to give the company the right of control of the streets, or to leave to the unrestrained will of the company the decision as to where and how the rails were to be placed. In the contract the rails were to be placed in such a manner as would least obstruct ordinary traffic, and all work of construction and repairs were to be done under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the city engineer, who testified that this widening of the devil-strip would interfere with the vehicular traffic; that he knew nothing of it until the work was completed, and that the repairs had not been made under his supervision and to his satisfaction.

CONFIDENCE IN DREAM AVERTS-RAILWAY WRECK

HARRISBURG, Pa., Sept. 13.—Confidence in a dream probably averted a big wreck on the Northern Central Railroad.

Engineer Burd, to ease his mind, determined to run slowly after passing Dauphin. So, speeding his train up to the limit till Dauphin was passed, Burd slowed up, and its engine chugged slowly, the engineer was able to bring his train to a stop with little or no damage.

Board of Education Property Committee Awards Contracts.

The property committee of the board of education yesterday afternoon decided to ask for tenders for fencing, grading and sodding, and for fitting up the science-room at Riverdale High School. COMBINED MUSEUM. Provincial and University Collections May Be Merged.

University and provincial authorities are proposing to combine the present provincial museum with that of the University of Toronto and making one fine museum.

The plan suggested is to build a large museum on university property west of the continuation of Avenue-road, although as yet no definite steps have been taken.

Both the university and province have specimens which the other has not, and the combining of the two would make one splendid museum, and along with the aid of the government would likely grant, would eventually make the museum one of the finest in the country.

WRECK IN MICHIGAN. G. T. R. Freight Crashes Into Another—Nine Cars Smashed.

DRETOIT, Sept. 13.—The second wreck on the Grand Trunk within two weeks occurred at Royal Oak Thursday afternoon at 2.45, when a Detroit-bound regular freight, running behind a "double-header," crashed into the rear end of a way freight unloading at the depot.

Nine box cars were crushed to splinters; both engines on the rear train were reduced to a scrap heap. The engineers and firemen barely escaped with their lives by the accident.

The cause of the accident seems to rest in the fact that the semaphore, which should have warned the train before it crashed into the rear end of the division, was never raised into place. Some blame the conductor of the advance freight for this negligence. Others say it was not his business to handle the semaphore.

DIFFERS FROM FRISCO. Vancouver Authorities Did Not Condone the Outrages.

TOKIO, Sept. 13.—In the Hochi this evening Count Okuma contrasts the anti-Japanese disturbances at San Francisco with the Vancouver riot, briefly, as follows:

"The latter occurrence must not be placed in the same category as the former. The San Francisco authorities directly or indirectly countenanced the acts of the rioters, while the municipal government was a centre of corruption, almost a state of anarchy prevailing. I liken the San Francisco riot to a boxers' break. President Roosevelt's attitude at first was very fair and admirable, but after his conference with a delegation from San Francisco, a change came which sadly disappointed us.

"The Vancouver incident was quite different. It was an outrageous act, limited to laborers, and unsupported. The local authorities sincerely did their utmost to suppress the riot and protect our countrymen. They even went so far as to give permission to our countrymen to take measures of self-defence. The sincerity so fully evidenced

of these really worthy local authorities of our ally in their effort to protect our rights makes us confident of effecting a satisfactory solution of the deplorable situation."
