CHICAGO'S PIONEER PACKER

Alfred E. Kent, Who Founded the

Great Industry That Made

the City, Dies.

MADE MILLIONS IN COMMERCE.

Cause of Distinguished Ancestry—

He Followed Practice

of Law.

Chicago, Jan. 9.—Alfred Emmet Kent,

one of Chicago's oldest and best-known

business men, died yesterday morning at

11 o'clock at the home of his widow, Mrs.

L. B. Kent, in Genoa, Neb., where he was

visiting. Thirty years ago Mr. Kent was

one of the leaders in the commercial life

of this city. He was one of the organizers

of the Chicago Exchange and one of the

founders of the Board of Trade. He was

also the originator of the optional

system of trading, which has since been

adopted by all the leading exchanges.

His great achievement lay in the founding

of the great packing industries which have

made Chicago famous the world over.

For six weeks past Mr. Kent has been

in Genoa looking after his large cattle

interests. In the performance of this work

he contracted the grip, which resulted in

his death.

Mr. Kent was born in Suffolk, Conn.,

Sept. 1, 1830, where he had been the owner

of the family for 300 years. Among the most

noted of his ancestors was the great, Chan-

celor, James Kent, the famous author of

the famous case of *Van Nostrand v. The*

To Receive the Soldiers.

Ald. Leslie presided over a joint meeting

of the Reception Committee and the officers

of the local battalions yesterday to discuss

arrangements for a suitable welcome to the

Toronto members of the returning second

contingent. The meeting was very largely

attended.

The following telegram was read:

"Halifax—One hundred, and thirty

men, in reply to an inquiry as to the

number of men who would come to Tor-

onto and the day of their arrival.

It was evident from the news published

concerning the returned soldiers that the

number of men would be very large. The

city hall will be profusely decorated with

flags, and it is hoped that the citizens

will decorate as much as possible. The fol-

lowing sub-committee has been appointed

to look after the details: Ald. Leslie, Com-

modore; Saunders, Woods, Col. Otter and other

local officers.

Queen's Park Decorated.

The decorations of the Parliament Build-

ings will be on a particularly elaborate
