DUTY OF THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY.

The Conservative party ought to take an early opportunity of placing itself on record in the House of Commons as still maintaining its old traditions in favor of protection and the National Policy, of its opposition to a one-sided trade preference policy, and of its determination to make every effort to extend the trade with colonies like Australia and South Africa, on the line of mutual preference, and that the time has arrived when the tariff should have special provision for adequate duties being imposed on the goods of countries which have a tariff hostile to Canadian produce, either by a high tariff or a maximum and minimum tariff, and enforcing the maximum against this country. The World has long upheld these ideas, and we think the time has arrived when they ought to be expressed in Parliament as the policy of the Conservative party.

SCHOOL OF PRACTICAL SCIENCE.

The Government should deal with the overcrowding in the School of Practical Science with a business that had exceeded the capacity of its store. As the latter would have no hesitation in enlarging its premises, but on the contrary would rather like pleasure in being forced to provide additional accommodation to meet the requirements of its growing business, so the latter should regard the necessity for enlarging the School of Practical Science as an evidence of prosperity and as a proof of substantial progress in the development of the province. The School of Practical Science is crowded because the country is in need of trained engineers for the construction of railways and canals; for the development of water power; for the erection of manufacturing buildings; for the treatment of minerals and for other such like purposes. No school or college in the country is doing better work than the one provided over by Prof. Gairdner with the material development of the country, and in the benefits of that development we all share to a greater or less degree. The duty of the Government in regard to the School of Practical Science is to seek to take advantage of the school. Ontario has just entered upon her career as a mining country. Our iron and nickel resources will absorb the services of hundreds of skilled engineers, and our manufacturing industries will need men and women in the coming Ontario election.

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP.

In discussing the question of municipal ownership, the so-called "better classes" are wont to discredit the theory by referring to the incapacity and dishonesty of the men who would be called upon to manage great business undertakings under municipal control. This argument is plausible one at first blush, but R. T. Ely, Professor of Political Economy in the University of Wisconsin, in an article in the North American Review, reasons back a little further, and shows that the corrupt representatives of the people are largely responsible for the corruption. The shareholders of franchise companies find it is in their interests to have their municipal franchises controlled by the people. If they do not want a council with too high a moral tone. What they do want is a "safe" council. Corruption among aldermen is winked at by the franchise companies, for the latter are only left undisturbed in the enjoyment of their monopolies. If we analyze the personnel of the share lists of the various gas, electric and traction companies of any city, we will find they will include the dominant elements of the city. The franchise companies are as a rule, directly and personally interested in the prevailing system of private ownership, and it is their antagonism to municipal ownership that is chiefly responsible for the low-grade council and for the difficulty of replacing private by municipal ownership. In the opinion of Prof. Ely, franchises will never be satisfactory. Toronto is legally a partner in the Consumers' Gas Company, and it was a statutory right to regulate the Railway Company in the operation of the street car service. Although we legally have control of these services our control is absolutely ineffective in securing our rights. "Those who talk big" says Prof. Ely, "about public control, but who are really private corporations owning and operating public utilities frequently exhibit a lack of interest in the public interest, and a ignorance of what their proposed remedy for existing evils means. They think in generalities, and do not reflect upon what control means in details. We have to observe, first of all, that public control of private corporations furnishing public utilities is called means a serious antagonism of interests in the civic household. Human nature is such that those who are to be controlled cannot be self-righteous and controlled. However righteous the control may be, those who are controlled will frequently feel themselves aggrieved and wronged, and will try to escape the control. It is, further, a necessary outcome of human nature that those persons who are to be controlled may either escape the control or shape it to their own ends. Again we must remember what vast aggregations of men and capital it is proposed to control. The men owning and operating the corporations which furnish public utilities are numerous, and they maintain large armies of employees of all social grades, from the gifted and highly trained attorney to the unskilled laborer. The amount of capital involved in the business is enormous. The very nature of the case brings it about that there should be persistent, never-ceasing activity on the part of those to be controlled. The effort to escape from this control, or to shade it, is a part of the effort by which men seek their livelihood, and their activity is as

The Dual Voting System.

Mr. Joynt's bill to amend the Municipal Act caused a warm discussion of the dual vote in connection with the election of members of the county councils. Mr. Joynt said that the dual vote had been so much abused as to procedure in Leeds and Grenville that members had gone to a back lot and drawn lots for wards.

Several members of the Government defended the dual vote. Mr. Davis gave such assurances of amendments next session that Mr. Joynt consented to withdraw his bill. This was the fourth time during the sitting that the Government took its initiative.

Mr. W. J. Hill introduced the conscience amendment to the Vaccination Act. Premier McGee suggested that no more bills be introduced until to-day, and that the Budget debate be resumed.

The Budget debate was resumed by Mr. T. H. Preston, who calmly claimed that the Liberal party during the past quarter of a century has given Ontario "the best government the world has seen."

The Opposition protested regarding West Elgin, where Mr. Preston was charged with the Liberal party returning officers guilty of corrupt action "learned the trick from Tory schoolmasters. To substantiate this he quoted irregularities at the Winnipeg election. He then read a statement from 23 ridings to show the number of rejected ballots under the Ontario Government.

Mr. Whitney: The judges did not think so.

Mr. Preston predicted that there were within hearing of his voice those who would live to see many millions inhabiting New Ontario.
