Six Thousand Press on to Dalny, While the Japanese Fleet Bombards It.

TAKE RUSSIAN COALING STATION

To-day's cables indicate great activity on the part of the Japanese forces. which has resulted in several reverses all in the neighborhood of Port Arthur. Near Talienwan, on Feb. 12, 600 Japanese landed, but were repulsed with the loss of 410 sabred by Cossacks. At Dove Pay another unsuccessful attempt to land cost them thirty lives. On the previous day another detachment, which landed at Pigeon Bay, West Port Arthur, was defeated with heavy loss. Other reports state that the Japs have bombarded Dalny and landed 6000 meu, and also occupied Chinghaiwen, a Russian coaling station, near Masampho. The railway behind Port

Majority of Kingston Council Secretly Prepare Slashing Motion, But Opposition is Expected.

Kingston, Feb. 14.-Staff special.)-A deadly blow has been struck by the city in the Street Railway fight, and one which is destined to cover the City Council with glory. On Saturday afternoon a secret meeting of a majority of the aldermen was held to discuss the course to pursue at the Council meeting Monday night in regard to the Street Railway matter, and it was unanimously decided that an appeal be made at once to the Ontario government, asking for remedial legislation to alter the present charter of the Street Railway Company by adding a penalty clause, striking out the provisions for running sleighs in winter instead of cars and to so amend the clause governing the operation of the system that it shall mean that the company be compelled to run the curs at all seasons

pelled to run the cars at all seasons in the year.

This will be the decisive step that the Council will ratify, giving the sovernment an opportunity to free the people from the despotic actions of the Street Railway, in whose hands is one of the most remarkable charters ever issued. A resolution has already been framed in substance as stated, and is being held in readiness by the aldermen to be presented at the proper moment to-morrow night.
