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

Mr. Sutherland said he fully agreed with the principle laid down by he member for Halton, and he was do-ing his best to put it in practice. Mr. Clarke suggested that there should be a model plan kept in the department, and this plan should govern the erection of public works. Referring again to the estimate for a public building in Alexandria Mr. Clarke asked if it was true that the lot for which the government paid lot for which the government paid \$3500 has right opposite it a better and larger lot which was sold recently for \$1500. Mr. Sutherland replied that he had decided on the more expensive lot and believed his choice was in the public interest.

public interest. In connection with an appropriation of \$10,000 for Stratford armory, Col. Hughes suggested that less expensive armouries should be built in large centres and company armouries estab-lished. Mr. Sutherland stated that he held the same view.

Repairs in Toronto.

An appropriation of \$8000 for To-ronto public buildings was then taken up. Mr. Sutherland explained that this money would be spent in repairs of various kinds to the customs house, the improvement of the lighting and general repairs for the inland revenue building, repairs of the Jusic ling, repairs at the Union Station and Station B

and Station B. On the item of \$20,000 for Toronto drill hall, Mr. Clarke asked what work had been done within the past twelve months. Mr. Sutherland replied that the department of militia had not yet perfected its plans, and the matter was still under consideration. The im-provements had not been started dur-ing the winter.

The tota expenditure on improvements to the custom hause was \$15,000. The work is practically complete. The new work will be done by public tender. Mr. Sutherland was not able to say where the magazine for which \$3000 has been appropriated would be hered.

On the appropriation of \$18,000 for the Toronto Junction postoffice, Mr. Suther-land stated that the total cost would be \$39,897. The contract had been given to the lowest tenderer.
