



FREES FRANCE'S HAND

Germany Will Not Embarrass Her in Moroccan Affair.

French Ambassador Has Interview With Chancellor Von Buelow-Mulai Hafig Not Recognized As Sultan-Regarded By French Gov ernment As Revolutionist-Spanish Colony Ask For More Protection. Paris, Aug. 27 .- France's attitude toward Mulai Hafig, the Sultan's

brother, who recently was proclaimed Sultan, is one of complete non-recognition of his authority as Sultan. It is officially pointed out that, although Mulai's power seems to be growing in the south, the people in the north appear to be loyal to the reigning Sultan, and until decisive events demonstrate that Mulai is actually the choice of the people, France is forced to regard him as a pretender and revolutionist.

cordial exchanges of views occurred between Ambassador Cambon and Chancellor Von Buelow on the sub-ject of Morocco, and that Germany appreciates the difficulty of France's position.

The Echo de Paris yesterday published a despatch from Berlin declaring that the impression caused there by the interviews between Ambassador Cambon and Chancellor Von Buelow, and between Premier Clemenceau and King Edward is "that the peace of Europe is solidified."

Berlin, Aug. 27.—Jules Cambon, the French ambassador to Germany, returned here yesterday from Norderney, satisfied with the results of his visit to Chancellor Von Buelow.

Possibly the most interesting subject to the French Government at present was the Moroccan situation, upon which the chancellor talked freely, repeating and elaborating Germany's willingness that France should use her own discretion at Casablanca, with the knowledge that Germany will not raise embarrassing

Germany will not raise embarrassing questions or seek in any way to place difficulties in her way, or hinder the French work of restoring order and securing the future safety of Europeans in Morocco.

Paris, Aug. 27.—The correspondent at Casablanca of The Matin telegraphs that a letter has been received in the Arab camp from Mulai Hafig, the newly proclaimed Sultan, announcing that he is marching to attack the French with numerous forces and several cannon. and several cannon.

He instructs the besiegers to refrain from action until his arrival.

Ask for Spanish Warships. Tangier, Aug. 27.—The Spanish colony here has voted to petition Spain to send additional warships to Tangier, on the ground that Spanish citizens have not sufficient protection.

Twenty-one persons were injured, none seriously, by the derailment of a northbound train on the Southern Railway at Red Hill yesterday. The entire train except the engine and tender turned over. The accident was caused by a broken rail. The train fortunately was running at moderate speed.

Our Trade With Japan Ottawa, Aug. 27.—Reporting to the rade and Commerce Department from Yokohama July 30, M. A. Mac-Lean, commercial agent for Japan, gives the total imports of Canadian flour into that country during the six months as valued at \$62,212, an in-crease of about \$20,000 over the im-ports for the corresponding period of 1906.

Exports of Japanese goods to the Dominion during the six months of 1907 amounted in value to \$469,189, as against \$495,541 worth imported in the six months of 1906, showing a decrease of \$26,354.

Gaynor Leaves Prison.

Macon, Ga., Aug. 27.—The United States circuit court of appeals had ordered Col. John F. Gaynor, under sentence for the Savannah Harbor frauds, and in jail here, pending appeal to be allowed to visit Indian Springs, for the benefit of his health, which is failing under confinement.

Col. Gaynor will be accompanied to the Springs by two deputy sheriffs, and will bear the expenses of the trip. The change is necessary, Col. Gaynor's physicians say, to preserve his life. Gaynor Leaves Prison.
