Berlin, July 20.—Germany is shocked by the newspaper revelations as to how her colonial empire is administered. The governor of the Cameroons. death leaves a blank which this counas a tyrant and loose liver, using his official power to gratify his unholy

This scandal has brought with it a regular political ferment. The colonial office denounces as traitors thos: who have revealed official secrets; while the newspapers deny that the revelations came from within the department. Herr von Puttkamer, of course, is being shielded by the bureaucracy from a too abrupt lettingdown, and will quietly vacate his post when the storm has blown over.

The colonial department recognizes that unless they hush up the affair as much as possible it will lead to a wholeale inquiry into their administration and very unpleasant consequences. What the bureaucrats fear most is the Social-Democratic party in the Reichstag, which is likely to seize on the Puttkamer affair and make the country ring with the misdeeds of the German colonial officials unless its attention is diverted by the counterdemonstration against the supposed traitors.

Germany's failure as a colonia! power was never more evident than now when she is involved in serious troubles in her three great African possessions-German East Africa, German Southwest Africa, and the Cameroons.
