



Food Controller Says Prices Must Not Go Beyond Present Level.

OTTAWA, Jan. 4.-Higher prices for OTTAWA, Jan. 4.—Higher prices for potatoes than those now prevailing will not be permitted. The food controller is sending a letter to this effect to all wholesale handlers of potatoes, stating that any attempt to secure higher prices will be dealt with promptly. If retail dealers should attempt to charge an unreasonable profit on potatoes, the food controller is prepared to fix the margin of profit and if necessary to fix maximum prices. In a statement issued tonight Mr. Hanna said:

"A recent survey of the situation by this office indicates that there is still a large supply of potatoes in the hands of the growers and dealers sufficient to meet a continuous and heavy demand neet a continuous and heavy demand intil the 1918 crop will be available. All handlers of potatoes should under-stand the situation clearly and realize that a special effort to keep the public plentifully supplied at reasonable prices is necessary in order that no part of the large crop of the last season be "In order to prevent possible loss "In order to prevent possible loss later in the season the winter movement of potatoes must be stimulated by every possible means. Potatoes are the only food of which Canada has a large surplus not in great demand for export. No effort should be spared, therefore, in using all the potatoes that can be eaten."


