choosing delegates to attend the Lib-
eral convention for North Middlesex,
being held at Ailsa Craig on August 20,
at 2 o'clock p.m. The Ailsa Craig
convention is for the purpose of choosing
a candidate and organizing for the
coming provincial election.

All men and women interested in
the cause of Liberalism are earnestly in-

Preparations are being made to
handle a record crowd at the conven-

ing promises to provide some food for

ANTI-HOARDING
CAMPAIGN GOES
MERRILY ALONG

Searching in Washington for
\$50,000,000 of Hoarded
Food.

ACTIVITY ELSEWHERE

Ohio Governor Asks for the
Seizure of 2,420,000
Pounds of Meats.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Close co-
operation between state authorities, who
possess detailed information of food and
price conditions, and the attorney-
general and his staff of assistants, em-
powered to enforce the food control law,
is being established as part of the Gov-
ernment's fight to reduce the cost of
living.
Instructions went out today from At-
torney-General Palmer to the two dis-
trict attorneys in Ohio to proceed im-
mediately to assist Governor Cox in the
seizure of large quantities of meat, but-
ter and eggs, alleged to have been held
in storage in that state for more than
six to ten months, the legal limits.
Criminal prosecutions will be instituted,
it was said, if it can be shown that the
foods were held from the market for the
purpose of hoarding prices. Officials
here were inclined to think that the long
period of storage indicated some other
reason than an effort to spread the
abundant supplies of a producing season
over the lean part of the year.

Acting on a telegram late today from
Governor Cox, saying that a Cleveland
concern, in order to escape possible
prosecution for hoarding, was moving its
meat products to warehouses in Chi-
cago, and destroying records, the depart-
ment of justice ordered the district at-
torney at Cleveland to look into the
matter immediately. All attempts to
effect transfer of goods in storage, offi-
cials said, would be summarily dealt
with.
Seizure of large stocks of foodstuffs
in storage continued today, with re-
ports secured of libels filed in Cleve-
land and Detroit, and preparations for
such action in many cities. The depart-
ment was informed tonight that the dis-
trict attorney of Detroit had filed libels
in three cases and seized approximately
10,000 eggs and 200,000 pounds of but-
ter, all of which had been held in stor-
age for some time.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Search for
owners of more than \$50,000,000 worth
of food hoarded in New York City is
being made today by the federal trade
commission and the United States dis-
trict attorney, it was learned here.

ASKS MEAT SEIZED.
COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 15.—Governor
Cox of Ohio today asked United States
Attorney-General Palmer to seize 2,420,-
000 pounds of meats stored in Ohio by
several big Chicago packers, on the
charges of "willful violation and even
defiance of the law."

DRIVE ON MILK PRICES.
NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—With federal
agents searching for millions of dollars
worth of food alleged to be hoarded
here, the state today began a drive
against high milk prices.

VOTE ON AMENDMENT.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—The state
agricultural committee planned today to
vote on Attorney-General Palmer's pro-
posed amendments to make the war-
time food control act more sweeping.
This legislation has met with opposi-
tion in the senate agricultural committee
and several senators, led by Smith, South
Carolina, and other Democratic mem-
bers, have resisted the attorney-gen-
eral's recommendations.

General Currie To
Have Pick of Any
Militia Position

OTTAWA, Aug. 15.—The Evening
Citizen says:
Gen. Sir Arthur Currie, who returns
to Ottawa on Monday, will have the
pick of any position in the militia de-
partment he desires. Probably he will
be made inspector-general of the forces
in Canada. Hereafter there have been
two inspectors, Gen. John Hughes in
Western Canada, and Gen. F. L. Les-
ter in the east. These positions were
quietly abolished some time ago and
the officers pensioned so a vacancy
exists. It is probable that the salary
will be made equivalent to that of both
the former positions.

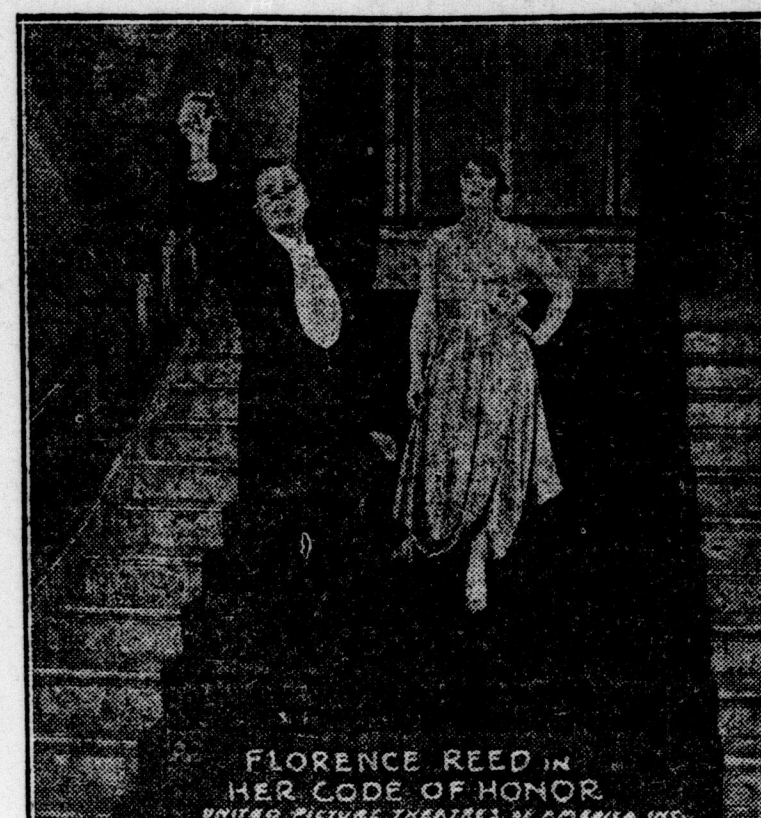

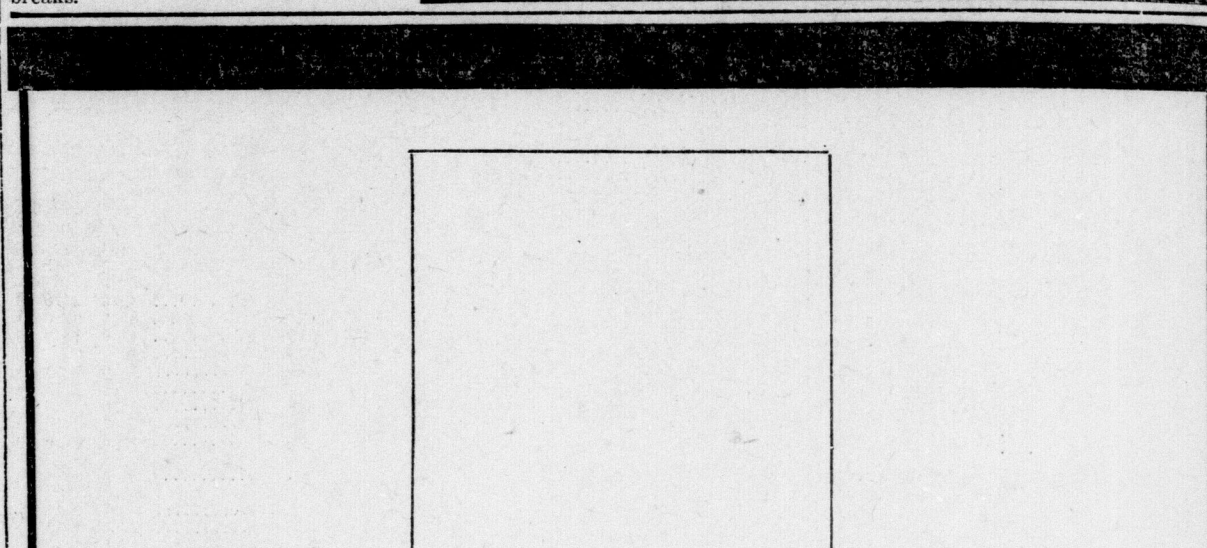
State Police Called
When Strikers and
Non-Union Clash

BUTLER, Pa., Aug. 15.—A troop of
state police arrived here this morning
and was placed on guard at the plant of
the Standard Steel Car Company, which
was the scene of rioting early today
between several thousand striking shop-
men and 500 non-union workers. The
strikers attacked the non-union men
with clubs as they were about to enter
the plant. A dozen persons were in-
jured, and the situation soon got be-
yond control of the local police and
deputies who were on guard at the
plant, where the strike has been in pro-
gress ten days, and the constabulary was
summoned to prevent further trouble.
Upon the arrival of the state police
the strikers withdrew from the zone
surrounding the plant, but feeling was
said to be running high. Up to noon,
however, there had been no new out-
breaks.
