UNIONISTS BROKE SOLEMN PLEDGE, SAYS M'KENZIE

Had Written Agreement With Liberals To Enact Franchise Act.

BUTTS ATTACKS FIELDING

Fred Pardee Clashes With Guthrie Over "Plugging" Votes.

OTTAWA, May 12.—Again in the House today the franchise bill held the center of the stage. Practically the whole afternoon and evening one clause was under discussion in committee, the clause providing for the preparation of voters' lists. Discussion ranged chiefly around a suggestion by Hon. W. S. Fielding that in Nova Scotia provincial lists would be used. The suggestion was combated by the solicitor general. He did not think that Nova Scotia lists would be satisfactory. For one reason, appeals in Nova Scotia went to a sheriff, who generally had no legal training, and was not qualified to give an opinion on a legal point.
A rather prosaic day was interspersed with lively incidents. Early in the sitting R. H. Butts of Cape Breton attacked Hon. W. S. Fielding. When prime minister of Nova Scotia, Butts declared, Mr. Fielding had discredited British subjects. Now Mr. Fielding was leading the cause of the alien. "In 30," shouted Mr. Butts, "you were taken by some freak of fortune into the Laramie cabinet." The chairman intervened, but bawling his desk, Mr. Butts demanded an answer. "No," Mr. Butts said, "I will drag you across to the library and show you Hansard." Mr. Butts then proceeded to pay no attention to the attack.
Roused Committee.
D. D. McKenzie roused the committee by declaring that when leading the Liberals he had a solemn agreement with the Government that the franchise act would be placed on the statute book. He produced a document and passed it across to the solicitor general. Mr. Guthrie, reading from the document, argued that Mr. McKenzie had been merely proposing a franchise act to cover by-elections until after next session of parliament.
Later Mr. Guthrie had a sharp clash with Fred Pardee of West Lambton. Mr. Guthrie had remarked that he could not teach Mr. Pardee anything in elections. Mr. Pardee wanted to know if an imputation was intended that he had "plugged" votes. There were interchanges. Mr. Guthrie observed that he had meant his remark as a good-humored joke. Mr. Pardee closed the discussion and the incident closed.

Finality in Lists.
Mr. D. D. McKenzie said when finality in the lists would be reached. Mr. Guthrie replied that unriveted lists would be the candidates' hand on nomination day and revised lists five days later. Jacques Bureau protested that the list would be revised in five days. Mr. Guthrie asked the clause pass as stands without the schedule, and then a conference be held on the proposals made in regard to the needs of the provinces. Mr. Guthrie said the chief objection to the schedule was that it was a state which was rural and which were urban.
After discussion the chairman ruled the schedule was not part of the clause. Mr. Bureau persisted that his amendment would come in the clause on which reconsideration would be necessary. The clause was finally allowed to stand and the House adjourned.

BE PAID CANVASSERS, DUNCAN ROSS CHARGES
OTTAWA, May 12.—Hon. Arthur Meighen secured first reading of a bill which seeks to give municipalities the same rights as hitherto enjoyed by provinces in the matter of regulating employment of canvassers.

Hon. C. J. Doherty's bill to amend the supreme court act was brought up for second reading. D. D. McKenzie suggested that the interpretation and rulings of the supreme court were the important part of the law. He suggested that the law be amended to the use of which they had accustomed themselves only after years of study. Only a genuine necessity for changing the practice of the supreme court would justify interference with the supreme court. The bill was passed by a majority of 10. Simplified Definition.
It simplified the definition of the word "person" and gave uniformity to the application of supreme court jurisdiction to all classes of a similar character, irrespective of what the cases originated in. The act had been introduced at the instance of the judges of the supreme court themselves, and contained provisions based on the court's experience.

The bill was reported for committee. The franchise bill was again taken up in committee. Clauses 44 and 45 dealing with alien amendments and the House proceeded to clause 32, dealing with the provincial lists where such were not more than one year old.
C. G. Power (Quebec South), protested against the provision that should be available to anyone on payment of a stated fee to the custodian. He objected to these lists being prepared by the Government and then distributed by the custodian to merchants or liquor dealers who had to circulate the lists.
Hon. Hugh Guthrie could see no reason why these lists should not be available to anyone.
Clause Amended.
On the motion of Mr. Guthrie, however, the clause was amended so as to provide that lists could be obtained by any person applying, therefore for the purposes of this act, on payment of a fee.
Duncan Ross (Middlesex) said that under the act, registrars would be paid canvassers for the Government in power. "If," he said, "we are to have public faith maintained in our representative institutions, we must see that voters' lists are absolutely correct and that they are not prepared in a partisan way."
The preparation should be in judicial hands and not left to the discretion of a partisan officer.
Mr. Ross indicated that he would probably bring in an amendment later to use either the municipal or the provincial lists.

LEADING FINANCIER

R. R. Hall Condemns U. F. O. Secretary For Writing Letters.

MOVE TO DEFEAT BILL

Says "Dictator" Would Cause Overthrow of Present Government.

TORONTO, May 12.—Condemning J. Morrison, United Farmers of Ontario secretary, as the "Rasputin" behind the Drury Government, R. R. Hall, Liberal member for Parry Sound, arose in his seat in the Legislature today and demanded that the Government take steps to "suppress" the letter-writing activities of that gentleman.

"For the last several days," declared the fiery northerner, "I have been receiving letters asking that I should vote in a certain direction that I should vote against the Government. General MacReady, Military Commander, Is Mum About His New Plans.

LONDON, May 12.—Gen. Sir Neville MacReady, military commander of Ireland, has framed new plans, by which he believes better order will be established in Ireland shortly.

Mr. Andrew Bonar Law announced in the House of Commons today that the plans had been approved by the cabinet. The Government leaders' statement followed questions regarding the national murder of two police constables at Cork last evening, and queries as to whether Gen. MacReady had taken steps to co-ordinate the police and the military forces.
Mr. Bonar Law said that the military commander has already taken most important steps, and at the cabinet meeting yesterday had proposed others. It was over the approval of the Government. What these steps were, Mr. Bonar Law did not say. He declared, however, that the plans would take any action which in his belief would restore decent conditions. Gen. MacReady is at present in London for consultation with the official and the newspapers predict important developments. In this connection it is unofficially stated that additional troops are to be sent to Ireland, and that the Government is prepared to give the military executive all assistance necessary to suppress lawlessness.

CHANGED HIS OPINION

CARRANZA PARTY LEFT MEXICO CITY ON FRIDAY MORNING

Rebels Entered Same Afternoon Without Bloodshed, Says Report.

MEXICO CITY, May 12.—(Via Dallas, Tex.)—The Carranza Government evacuated Mexico City Friday morning and the advanced forces of the revolutionists, led by Gen. Pablo Gonzales, entered the capital that afternoon. Gen. Carranza followed Sunday morning at the head of 10,000 troops.

The occupation was effected with perfect order and there was no shooting in connection with the change in government. Carranza's Government officials were forced to abandon the city when they learned that 40,000 revolutionists were marching on the town. Less than ten thousand troops at the capital are reported to have remained loyal to the Carranza Government.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—The Government's campaign to deport alien radicals and stamp out bolshevism in the United States stands in danger of complete collapse as the result of the action of William B. Wilson, secretary of labor, in giving the Communist Labor party a clean bill of health.

Ruling in the test case of Earl Miller, a German, who had affiliated himself with the Communist Labor group, Secretary Wilson held that membership in the organization was not sufficient grounds for deportation under the provisions of the act of October 16, 1918. It was the opinion of the secretary of labor, whose word is final in deportation cases, that the Communist Labor party differed from the Communist party of America, which he outlawed in 1918, in its methods of tactics. While both subscribed to the principles of the third international of Moscow, Mr. Wilson averred the communist labor party was not pledged to force and violence, as were the members of the Communist party of America.

Given Out by Post.
The ruling, although signed by Secretary Wilson, was made public in the form of a memorandum to the commissioner of immigration from Louis F. Post, assistant secretary. Mr. Wilson, whose administration of the department during Secretary Wilson's recent illness has been the object of attack by officials of the department of justice and investigation by a congressional committee, looking to Mr. Post's impeachment.

The direct result of the ruling will be to cancel deportation warrants from more than 100 members of the Communist Labor party arrested in the December raids, and the calling off by the department of justice of a round-up of such men. It is pointed out that the department of justice, which cannot recover without additional legislation.

Haven for Reds.

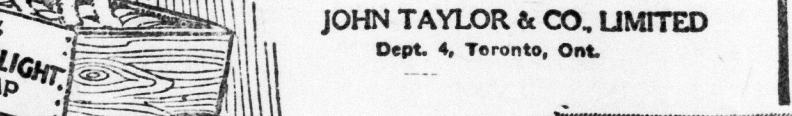
