Had Written Agreement With Liberals To Enact Franchise Act.

BUTTS ATTACKS FIELDING

Fred Pardee Clashes With Guthrie Over "Plugging" Votes.

OTTAWA, May 12.—Again in the House today the franchise bill held the stage. During practically the whole afternoon and evening one clause was under discussion in committee—the clause providing for the preparation of voters' lists. Discussion ranged chiefly around a suggestion by Hon. W. S. Flelding that in Nova Scotia provincial lists would be used. The suggestion was combatted by the solicitor-general. He did not think that Nova Scotia lists would be satisfactory. For one reason, appeals in Nova Scotia went to a sheriff, who generally had no legal training, and was not qualified to give an opinion on a legal point.

A rather prosaic day was interspersed with lively incidents. Early in the sitting R. H. Butts of Cape Breton attacked Hon. W. S. Fielding. When prime minister of Nova Scotia, Mr. Butts declared, Mr. Fielding had disfranchised British subjects. Now Mr. Fielding was leading the cause of the alien. "In '90," shouted Mr. Butts, "you were taken by some freak of fortune into the Laurier cabinet." The chairman intervened, but banging his desk, Mr. Butts demanded an answer. "No." Mr. Butts called out, "don't answer me! If you do, I will drag you across to the library and show you Hansard of the debate." But Mr. Fielding payed no attention to the attack.

OTTAWA, May 12. — Hon. Arthur Meighen secured first reading of a bill which seeks to give municipalities the same rights as hitherto enjoyed by provinces in the matter of regulating employment offices.

When Hon. C. J. Doherty's bill to When Hon. C. J. Doherty's bill to amend the supreme court act was brought up for second reading, D. D. McKenzle suggested that the interpretations and rulings of the supreme court were the implements of the lawyer's trade, to the use of which they had accustomed themselves only after had accustomed themselves only after years of study. Only a genuine neces-sity for changing the practice of the supreme court would justify interfer-ence with the precedence surrounding the practice of that court, which might freckled skin.

the practice of that court, which might render useless the textbooks written around the act, and the valuable precedent contained in privy council rulings on supreme court procedure.

Mr. Doherty said that he shared Mr. McKenzie's objection to a modification of the supreme act insofar as the constitution of the court was affected. The object of this bill was quite different.

The bill was reported for committee. The franchise bill was again taken up in committee. Clauses 44 and 45 carried with slight amendments, and the House passed to clause 32, dealing with the provincial lists where such were not more than one year old.

Clause Amended.

DUBLIN, May 4.—(Associated Press) -Cinflicts over land, attended by organized "cattle Crives," to intimidate land owners and compel them to sell, have been added lately to Ireland's other troubles. The disturbances are a revival of conditions which prevailed 30 or more years ago, when farmers and graziers were forced by similar methods to sell their land holdings. The malcontents complain that most of the good land in the south and west of Ireland is being used for grazing purposes, and that they are unable to purchase it. 

CARRANZA PARTY LEFT MEXICO CITY ON FRIDAY MORNING

Rebels Entered Same Afternoon Without Bloodshed. Says Report.

MEXICO CITY, May 12.—(Via Dallas, Tex.).—The Carranza Government evacuated Mexico City Friday morning and the advanced forces of the revolutionists, led by Gen. Pablo Gonzales, entered the capital that afternoon. Gen. Obregon followed Sunday morning at the head of 10,000 troops.

The occupation was effected with perfect order and there was no shooting in connection with the change in government.

Carranga's Government officials were forced to abandon the city when they learned that 40,000 revolutionists were marching on the town. Less than ten thousand troops at the capital are reported to have remained loyal to the Carranza Government. HELD SUCCESSFUL SALE.
