

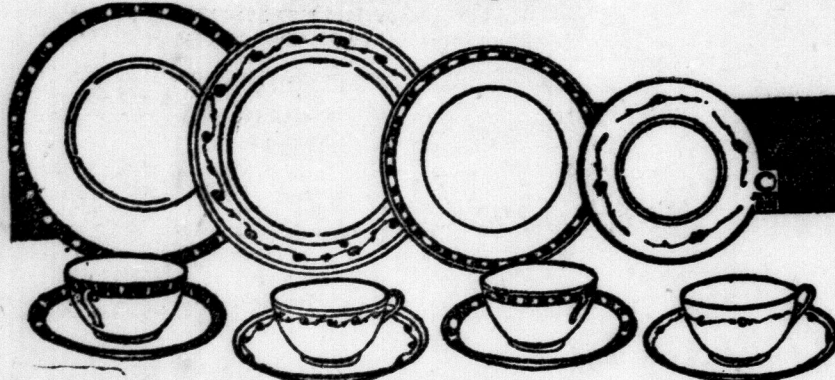

HOLLAND BREAKS RELATIONS WITH JUGO-SLAVIA

Charges Long Series of Insults To Dutch Government.

INSOLENT TREATMENT

Termed Only Diplomatic Incident—No Developments Expected.

THE HAGUE, Dec. 13.—Diplomatic relations between Holland and Jugo-Slavia have been broken off, it was stated here today.

Holland has recalled her minister from Belgrade and has dismissed the Serbian charge d'affaires at The Hague.

The action was taken as the result of what the Dutch foreign office terms "a long series of insults to the Dutch Government."

The beginning of the difficulty was the arrest in the early part of the war, without notification to Holland, of the Dutch consul at Belgrade, who was an Austrian subject. Since then, according to the foreign office, repeated efforts by Holland to adjust the difficulties amicably had met with insolent treatment.

The break is only a diplomatic incident, and no other developments are expected, the Associated Press correspondent was told at the foreign office today.

REMINDS GOVT. OF ITS DUTIES TO WORKLESS

Moore Says Meighen Administration Ought To Make Voice Heard.

TORONTO, Dec. 13.—President Tom Moore of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, who is in the city today outlined during the course of an interview what he considered to be the most practical and most effective manner in which the present unemployment situation should be met at this time.

For immediate relief, Mr. Moore said, cash doles are an absolute necessity, though he is unalterably opposed to the principle as a measure for combating ill effects of unemployment.

Moreover, he holds that the Dominion Government as well as all the Provincial and Municipal Governments have a direct responsibility in the question, and all have a duty to perform without delay. Employers, at the same time, he said, have a duty to perform, and he is looking to the welfare of our communities and the country as a whole, should distribute the work they have on hand among as many as possible, giving the greatest amount of work to the greatest number.

In this connection Mr. Moore suggests a definite official declaration by the Dominion Government, pointing out to the employers the responsibility that rests upon them in the present situation, would be a timely pronouncement.

FARMERS LIKELY TO TALK TARIFF AND POLITICS

May Create Political Party At Ontario Meeting On Wednesday.

TORONTO, Dec. 13.—Among the questions likely to come before the United Farmers of Ontario at their annual three-day meeting here this week, beginning on Wednesday, are the tariff and the creation of a provincial political party, as required by Dominion legislation with respect to campaign financing.

About 1,000 delegates are expected to attend the annual meeting.

The United Farmers' Co-operative Company, Limited, will meet on Tuesday, when one item of business will probably be asking for official ratification of a proposed \$250,000 increase in capitalization.

A. J. Powers is president of the U. F. Co-operative Company, and J. J. Morrison, secretary.

R. W. E. Turnaby, U. F. O. candidate in North York for the Federal House, is president of the U. F. O., and J. J. Morrison is secretary.

MILLS REDUCE WAGES. PUTNAM, Conn., Dec. 13.—Many textile mills in Eastern Connecticut today posted notices of wage reductions effective a fortnight hence.

FORCE WOMEN TO PAY DUTY ON PURCHASES

Inspector At the Border Has Searched 9,000 Christmas Shoppers.

WINDSOR, Dec. 13.—At least 70 per cent of the goods seized at the ferry dock by Mrs. Martha Ogilvie, special customs official, were purchased from three months to four years ago in Detroit.

This statement was made today by Mrs. Ogilvie, in discussing the searching of Windsor women who shop in Detroit.

One coat, on which the owner paid duty plus the original price of the garment, was purchased five years ago in Detroit.

"Girls working in Detroit and living in Canada are not entitled to bring in clothing or any other drygoods duty free," Mrs. Ogilvie said, "I have tried to ward off workers in Detroit that this is the case."

Five Times As Much. Five times as much goods is being declared at the dock by shoppers as before the appearance of the woman searcher, customs officials say. The majority of these purchases are toys and Christmas trimmings.

According to Mrs. Ogilvie, the traffic from Detroit to Windsor is not as heavy as it was. During the past few days she seized nearly \$2,000 worth of goods from women, upon which the duty was paid to the tune of \$1,000.

She has kept a list of the number she has searched, but places the figures at 8,000 or 9,000 women.

Compliments Women. The special officer, who is making many women buy their presents on this side of the river through her careful scrutiny, paid a compliment to the women of the border cities. Mrs. Ogilvie said she had very little trouble, and that women seldom objected to her searching them. This, she said, is a compliment, as she explained, was due to impatience, because occasionally women in a hurry are held up for a considerable length of time.

BILL TO STOP ALL IMMIGRATION GOES TO SENATE

United States House of Representatives Passes the Measure.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—The House of Representatives today passed and transmitted to the Senate the Johnson bill prohibiting practically all immigration to the United States for a period of one year. The vote in the House on the measure, 293 to 41, brought to an end more than three days of heated debate on immigration affairs. It also followed futile attempts by the bill's supporters to lengthen the prohibition period to two years as originally proposed. The first of these attempts brought a rising vote in favor of the two-year exclusion, but a second showed 181 in favor of the one-year period and only 165 opposed.

In the Senate the bill will be referred to the immigration committee, and the action will be deferred until the committee has concluded hearings and investigated thoroughly all phases of immigration and naturalization questions.

REFUSES TO AID FARMERS WITH CREDIT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 13.—The Senate late today passed the agriculture committee resolution declining the revival of the war finance corporation as a measure of affording relief to farmers.

The second section of the resolution, which, as introduced, would have directed the extension of liberal credits to farmers by the Federal Reserve system, was amended to make the desirability of such course only an expression of opinion of Congress.

PRINCE GEORGE MAY SECURE PAPER MILL

PRINCE GEORGE, B. C., Dec. 13.—Plans are practically completed for establishing a pulp and paper mill at this point to cost over \$5,000,000 by a number of eastern capitalists, who have been looking over the ground, including Angus McLean of the Bathurst, N. B. Lumber Company; Frank Jones, president of the Canada Cement Company, and M. E. Priest, president of the Haining Paper Company, Buffalo, N. Y.

McLean declared the plant would be one of the most modern in Canada, and would employ 1,000 men. The coast was found exceptionally suited for the industry. Three kinds of paper can be made, including the finest bond.

FOUND DEAD IN BUSH AFTER FOUR-DAY ABSENCE

TORONTO, Dec. 13.—Norman D. Davidson, 28 years of age, who was missing from his home since December 9, was found dead in a bush in the western outskirts of this city today with a bullet wound in his head and a rifle in his left hand. He had been employed by the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association, and on the day of his disappearance was supposed to have gone to work.

THE MARKET HOUSE

COUNCIL FOR INDUSTRIAL RESEARCH WOULD ENLARGE MEMBERSHIP TO FIFTEEN

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Dec. 13.—A meeting of the scientific and industrial research council was held here on Saturday, at which eight of the eleven members of the council were present, as follows: Dr. McCallum, chairman; Professors Adams and Eustan, McGill; President Murray, Saskatchewan; Dr. Goodwin, Queen's; Mr. Lloyd Harris, Brantford, and Mr. R. A. Ross, Montreal.

Mr. Ross, who is chairman of the committee dealing with the briquetting of western lignite coals, reported on a recent visit to the plant, which is being erected at Estevan. It is expected to be in operation in three months' time, turning out briquettes at the rate of 30,000 tons a year. The product will have the same fuel value as anthracite, ton for ton, and will be marketed at less than half the present price of that fuel.

Would Increase. Among the proposals which the council will make to the Government is that its numbers should be increased from eleven to fifteen, so as to give representation to certain basic industries. It recommended to the privy council that a number of grants should be made for the assistance of certain researches of pressing importance to Canadian science and industry, and repeated its recommendation that Dr. A. Stanley McKenzie, president of Dalhousie University, should succeed Dr. McCallum, who resigned in October, but has been carrying on in an honorary capacity.

Expected Appointment. It is expected that the appointment will be made immediately on the return of Sir George Foster to Canada, but there seems to be some doubt as to whether separate heads will be appointed to the council, and the proposed research institute, as the council favors, Dr. McKenzie has not yet signified his acceptance of the position as chairman of the council, and it is understood that his appointment will eventually be as head of the research institute.

Dr. McCallum, who has filled the position of chairman of the council with great distinction for the past four years, is now occupying the chair of bio-chemistry at McGill. He leaves on March 1, for China, where he will spend

seven months as a lecturer in the University of Peking, having been selected for that honor by the Rockefeller Foundation.

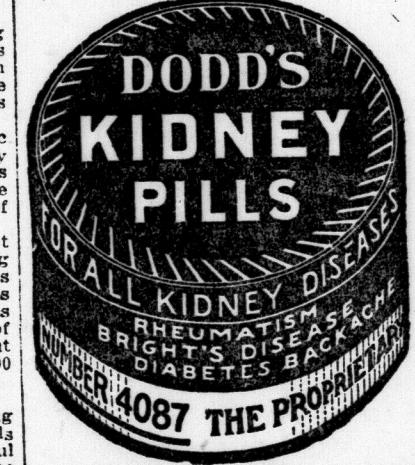
