MILK PRODUCERS FAVOR LOCAL DELIVERY

Big Meeting on Saturday Endorse Proposal to Handle City Trade—May Lower Prices.

Perfect unanimity and the greatest enthusiasm were the outstanding features of a big special meeting of members of the Toronto Milk Producers' Association held in Victoria Hall in this city on Saturday afternoon.

In view of the fact that the Centre York Conservatives and the York County branch of the vegetable growers were in session at the same time, the attendance was unusually large.

President J. G. Corneil was in the chair, with A. J. Reynolds as secretary, and it is safe to say that no meeting of the association ever hitherto held was characterized by a greater attention to business.

Discussed Delivery. Saturday's meeting was called primarily to discuss the question of a city delivery directly under the control of the association, wholly independent of the city dealers, and the proposal found the heartiest endorsement.

A joint stock company conducted on co-operative lines, as in the cities of the old land, would be an unequalled success," said Levi J. Annis, one of the late government commissioners, to the Edinburgh Exhibition.

Mr. Annis was stationed in Edinburgh and other large cities for six months last year, and made a close study of the matter.

Old Discards. "Pasteurization has wholly been discarded in Great Britain," said Mr. Annis, and its continuance in this city is largely responsible for the infant mortality. He urged the farmers to go further and deliver the milk to the citizens clean, fresh, and at a reasonable rate.

Mr. J. W. Breakley of Thornhill, Mr. Shaver and Councillor Grubbe of Etobicoke, Mr. Magin and John H. H. Crawford, Mr. Querrle, Anthony Forster and others warmly favored a joint stock company.

Will Discuss Later. Regarding the location of a central distributing station, the selection of a manager, and other details, no definite action was taken. A strong committee was appointed to secure all the information, and they will later report at a big mass meeting.

Relations have not been harmonious between the farmers and the dealers for some time owing to the fact that the latter have on several occasions failed to conform to their contract.

Added to this is the fact that the farmers are not receiving a fair return on the capital invested. No difficulty will be experienced in securing all the capital required.

Like Standard Can. The farmers expressed their satisfaction with the standard eight gallon can, and will resist any legislation seeking to do away with the can and selling by the pound.

Some discussion took place relative to the summer price for milk, the price for which has been \$1.55 for the winter and \$1.35 for the summer months delivered.

Was For a Year. The last contract made in the fall was, it is understood, for one year at the prices quoted, and from information which has come to President Corneil and other members of the association it is believed that with some slight concessions on either side there will be no difficulty this spring.

Reference was made to the death of the late lamented Mr. Chester, for many years president of the association. A meeting of the committee will be held in Scarborough on Thursday evening to further the new project.

NORTH TORONTO. Consensus of Opinion is All in Favor of Paroled Road.

NORTH TORONTO, March 7.—"That this meeting of the ratepayers of York Township and the Town of North Toronto, recognizing the obstacle now presented by Mount Pleasant Cemetery to the expansion of the city of Toronto, and its northern suburbs, is of the opinion that thoroughfare through the cemetery property are essential to the welfare of the interested municipalities, and that a street as close, and parallel to Yonge-street, as possible, is immediately desirable, hereby requests the various municipalities to use their utmost endeavors to obtain such a thoroughfare, and that a committee be appointed to memorialize the Ontario Government to pass such legislation as will conform with the desires of this meeting of ratepayers."

The foregoing resolution was carried unanimously at a public meeting held in the town hall on Saturday night. The meeting was a thoroughly representative one, being made up, not only of North Toronto's ratepayers and town council, but by the president and secretary of the Deer Park Ratepayers' Association; Reeve Geo. WEST TORONTO. WEST TORONTO, March 7.—Another case of smallpox has developed in this town, and this particular instance depicts the mystery regarding the origin of the present epidemic. Otto Neimeier, a third year student in medicine, eldest son of Dr. Neimeier, East Annette-street, has been ill for over a week with typhoid fever, and on Friday last, his father, who was attending him, and consultation with a specialist in Toronto. Later on Dr. Sheard diagnosed the symptoms of the disease and the three doctors agreed that the case was developing into smallpox. Dr. Gilmour, M.H.O., was consequently notified on Saturday morning and at noon the patient was removed to the Swiss Cottage. The house and all the members of the family have been put under a strict quarantine.

QUARTET FOUND GUILTY CONSPIRACY CHARGE

Jury Bring in Recommendation to Mercy—Judge Calls Jury Back to Clear Away Objections.

A verdict of guilty with a recommendation to mercy was returned at 3:15 Saturday night against former G. T. R. Conductors Dan Corrigan and Frank McCallum, and Harry Rosenbes and Joseph Woods. They will not be sentenced until the end of the session, and will in the meantime remain in the jail, ball being absolutely refused.

The quartet were arrested in a roundup planned to take effect simultaneously in Montreal and Toronto. Rosenbes and Woods were suspected of having manufactured bogus tickets good for passage between Toronto and Montreal, which were sold at about \$4 each, and which the two conductors, by special arrangement, accepted in lieu of the regular tickets.

The verdict was returned on the first count of the conspiracy charge. The Grand Trunk Railway, in accordance with Judge Winchester's instructions that if from the evidence the jury were convinced that there was a common design they could not bring in a verdict against one and allow the others to go free. A man could not complete himself, the judge said, and option on the other five counts, if they thought the evidence warranted it, to find two of them, three of them, or all of them guilty as they seemed just.

Jury Called Back. The jury were out two hours and fifteen minutes. As they retired to consider the evidence, Messrs. Robinson, Curry and Geary, counsel for the defence, jumped to their feet with a host of objections to the manner in which the evidence was charged, and they argued so a good half hour. The judge was then recalled and the jury carefully went over the points raised, and their verdicts were admitted.

believed you must accept their evidence as truth. Referring to the use of the detectives in the case, his honor said: "It is necessary, gentlemen, as long as crime is committed, to employ detectives to investigate such cases to the ends of justice. True, they may be men whom we should not wish to associate with."

When his honor re-addressed the jury, he said: "If I stated that there was a common design I had no privilege to do so, but should have said it was your right to draw an inference from the facts established in the evidence, that there was a common design. As to my query, 'Was that all done for friendship?' to which Mr. Robbette takes exception, I will say that it is immaterial whether it was done for friendship or for money, if they did wrong, and that is for you to decide."

"And I have been criticized as saying this case was on all fours with the other cases, I say it is your privilege to decide whether it is an adultery or not. I was read to have been incorrect in saying that Reckie swore that he took tickets down and handed them to Rosenbes. There is no need of any explanation on this point, the evidence is quite clear. I did make a mistake in saying Reckie got two hats checks from Woods. What I should have said was that he got two tickets for a short distance out of the city."

"An objection was also raised that I had said you take 100 tickets and multiplied them by \$16.70 and you will have a very large sum of money, which the company did not get. I could not have said this, and I'm sure you did not understand me to have made such a statement, because we have no idea and no possible way of ascertaining or giving any accurate statement as to the number of tickets that had been sold. There is utterly no evidence as to how many were issued. I might add that an acquittal in the charge of conspiracy would not acquit them on a charge of fraud."

Mr. Curry had also suggested that his honor should have told the jury that no evidence had been put in by G.T.R. officials to show that the money for these tickets did not reach the company, but the judge made no further allusion to the tip.

SCIENCE AND SUPERSTITION Subject of Saturday's Lenten Lecture at Trinity.

Saturday's Lenten lecture at Trinity College was by G. S. Brett, B.A. (Oxon). "The conflict between science and superstition in the sixteenth century," and was listened to with close attention by a large audience.

Superstition, he explained, was in some measure a logical counterpart to the asceticism preached by the church in that period.

In Luther we saw how one of the strongest minds of the century, with an intense religious belief and a strong grasp upon the needs of the age, could still be infected by a mythical and at times grossly materialistic vein of thought.

Erasmus was taken as representing the distinctly scientific temperament. The tendency to go back to nature and reason, the rationalism, led to superstition if carried out too rapidly.

Paracelsus' re-establishment of the whole source of medicine upon a new basis was a case in point. He declared that all his teaching was contained in the Bible and that the prophets, and especially Moses, were the greatest scientific teachers in the history of the world.

Giordano Bruno also spoke on a large subject in a way not calculated to be understood by the people. In conclusion, Mr. Brett said that in regard to the opposition between any established body of truth and the claims of advanced thinkers, we should always walk cautiously for fear of trampling out what might be of great ultimate value. When we thought of Bruno, and thought that what was condemned in them was accepted as
