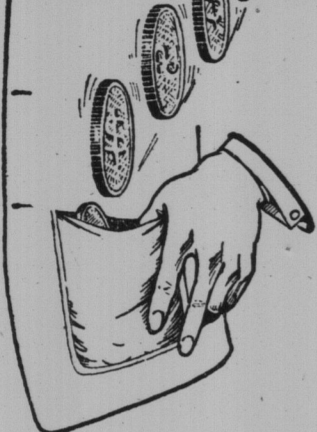

ARMY APPOINTEE OF WILSON CHARGED WITH DISLOYALTY

United States Senate Military Committee Hears Startling Accusations Against Col. Reichmann

Washington, Aug. 22—The appointment of Colonel Carl Reichmann, U. S. A., to be brigadier general in the regular army, recommended by the president in the week, was abruptly held up by the Senate Military Affairs Committee today, when startling charges were made against him as to utterances expressing sympathy with Germany in its submarine and Zeppelin warfare and criticizing the policy of the administration in sending American troops to France.

When Senator Poindeux read the letter to the committee, he said: "Germany is not fighting Belgium, but is now only fighting England."

NEW AIRPLANES FOR THE ALLIES

Cannot Upset in the Air—French Engineer Says New Craft Can Hold Position at Low Speed

A new type of aeroplane differing in construction and appearance from machines now in use in the warring countries has recently been perfected in France by Pierre Octave Detable, a mechanical engineer of Paris, technical director in the Societe Generale Industrielle, who is in America in connection with the rehabilitation of northern France.
