CANADIAN CAVALRY IN ENEMY TERRITORY

Patrols From Dominion Scouting After The Great Victory at Courcellette

Canadian Headquarters in France, via London, Oct. 6.—Canadian communications, September 28 to Oct. 3.—Severe fighting continued almost without cessation during the last week. The Germans brought up reinforcements and fresh troops and opposed at times a desperate resistance to our advance.

Five patrols went forward into enemy territory. Two located German lines in Despremont Farm, more than a mile beyond our lines. One of our men was killed and another wounded and two horses killed.

New York, Oct. 6.—Private banking interests of high standing are encouraging the buying of the standard railroad stocks, especially Illinois, Harriman and trunk line issues.

Attention is being directed by important western institutions to the fact that the high prices for grain and cotton are certain to stimulate the production of big wheat and cotton crops next year, and that, with the high prices for grain, the tonnage for the roads is certain to be highly profitable for at least a year and a half.

Positive predictions of favorable dividend action on the preferred stock are coming from responsible circles, which point to the fact that Erie common is now earning at a rate of about 7 per cent.

FORWARDING OF CLOTHING TO OUR PRISONERS OF WAR
The following is a copy of a communication which is being promulgated to all units in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, such being an extract from letter received from Ottawa:

The Officer Commanding, Inquiries received at militia headquarters from time to time, from relatives of Canadian prisoners of war in Germany with respect to the method by which clothing may be forwarded to them, and in this connection I am directed to inform you that there is a committee of Canadians living in London, Eng., who supply the necessary clothing, etc., to Canadian prisoners of war in Germany.

Relatives and friends of these prisoners should notify the number and name of the prisoner, the unit of the expeditionary force to which he belongs, and the place of internment, and give particulars of requirements to this committee, when the needs of our prisoners of war will receive prompt attention.

All communications should be addressed to: Mrs. Rivers-Bulkeley, care of Red Cross Society, 14-16 Gockspur St., London, S. W., England.
