

## GALLAUX STANDS LAID BY PRESS OF PARIS

Even Bitterest Critics Praise Finance Minister For Heroic Statement

PARIS, July 7.—Even the bitterest of Finance Minister Callaux's critics today paid homage to him for his brilliant statement before the Chamber of Deputies yesterday. Almost the only dissident editorial comment in the communist Journal L'Humanite, which says "the old young leading man muffled his entrance on to the stage."

Lucien Romier, who declined an offer by former Premier Herriot of M. Callaux's present hazardous post, while he admires the finance minister's truth telling, warns in Figaro that the preliminary battle has just begun, and that the fate of the cabinet depends, after all, on the vote of the moderate members of the Chamber.

### ASKS FULL POWERS

M. Callaux yesterday asked the Chamber to give the cabinet power to effect governmental economies or arrange other details for stabilization of the franc by decree of the cabinet. If the "full powers" are granted it will be the first time in the history of the "third republic" although M. Poincare asked for such powers in 1924 in order to obtain \$100,000,000 credit from J. P. Morgan and Company.

With the exception of irreconcilable radicals and conservative extremists, the House cheered M. Callaux loudly yesterday when he presented his program.

### Deaths

#### Surgeon Stevens

MONCTON, July 6.—The death occurred here this afternoon at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. W. Groundwater, 108 Cornhill street, of Surgeon Stevens, general contractor of this city. Mr. Stevens had been in ill health for some time but for the past three weeks had been seriously ill. He was a native of Albert county, being a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Solomon Stevens and was 68 years of age.

#### English Court Denies Silence Gives Consent

LONDON, July 7.—The old axiom that "silence gives consent" is not accepted by English law, under a recent ruling of the court of criminal appeal. A prisoner, accused of receiving stolen goods, had remained silent when asked whether guilty or not guilty, and his silence was taken as a plea of guilty. He was sentenced by the lower courts to five years of penal servitude. But the court of appeal ruled that the silence was not adequate evidence of a plea of guilty by the prisoner, and discharged the convicted man.

#### Blind Student Wins High School Honors

BOSTON, July 7.—Though he is stone blind, Fred Leach was graduated from Watertown High School with honors. Next Fall he plans to enroll at the Philadelphia College of Osteopathy, where he will study for a professional career. Leach, who is 21 years old, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Leach of New Haven, Conn. Despite his handicap, he was awarded the Washington-Franklin medal for excellence in history, and was elected to the Cum Laude society, the high school equivalent of Phi Beta Kappa.

#### Release From Jail Causes Man's Death

MEXICO CITY, July 7.—When Eustaquio Garcia, awaiting trial in a Toluca jail on a statutory charge, was informed by his son that he had been arranged pending the calling of his case, he fell backwards as though he had fainted. His joy at approaching release had killed him.

## THREE NAMED FOR VARSITY FACULTY

Norman MacKenzie, Dal. Graduate, to Lecture in Law at Toronto

TORONTO, Ont., July 7.—University of Toronto officials last night announced three of the most important appointments to the staff of the University for next session. Professor Gilbert Norwood, of University College, Cardiff, Wales, succeeds Prof. John MacNaughton, who retired this year. Norman MacKenzie, a graduate of Dalhousie University, Halifax, and legal advisor to the Labor Bureau of the League of Nations, comes to lecture in law, and Dr. F. C. Green, of the University of Rochester, will assume a full professorship in the French Department.

### Hawaii Governor Gets 7 Cents Wages

HONOLULU, July 7.—A certified check for seven cents was presented to Hon. Wallace R. Farrington, Governor of Hawaii, by the Matson Navigation Co. here recently, in payment for labor done by the executive in Philadelphia shipyards. While on an official trip to the mainland, Governor Farrington inspected the building of the S. S. Malolo, new passenger liner which will be put on the Honolulu-San Francisco run next year. At the request of the builders, he drove a rivet into the hull of the boat. The company reciprocated with a check.

### Zoned Cities in U. S. Show Rapid Increase

WASHINGTON, July 6.—More than 27,000,000 people live in zoned cities in the United States today while less than 6,000,000 had this distinction ten years ago. Reports to the Commerce Department indicate 486 municipalities have zoning requirements now while only six cities of the country were zoned in 1916.

### Swedish Premier Was Stone Cutter

STOCKHOLM, July 7.—A former stone cutter, Carl Gustaf Ekman, is now prime minister of Sweden. The democratization of Sweden in the past hundred years is illustrated by the fact that until 1828 no commoner had ever served as member of the royal council, whereas in the present cabinet not a single nobleman is included.

BERLIN, July 7.—German cabarets are struggling desperately for survival. In Berlin alone, the number of amusement haunts, numbering 2,000 during the post-war inflation period, has now shrunk to three large and nine small vaudeville houses, 88 cabarets and 11 dancehalls.

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## N. B. INDIAN, 102, IS DEAD AT ST. STEPHEN

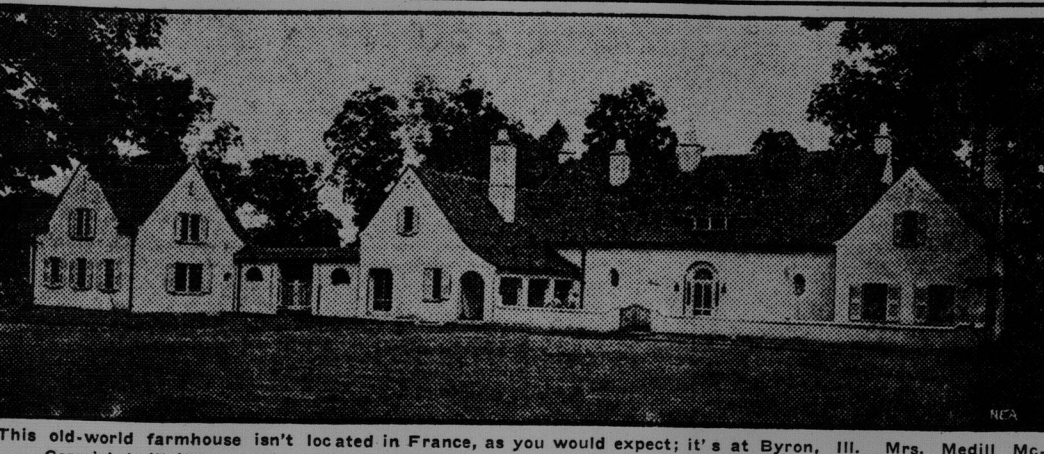
Succumbs to Injuries Received While Playing Games at Camp
