STRONG MAN LIFTED BRICK; NEAR DEATH

Man Who Played With 1,000-Pound Weights, Beaten by Trifle. NEW YORK, Oct. 21-(United News)—Selig Whitman once wound his mighty fingers around the bar of a 1,000-pound dumbbell and hoisted it over his head. Another time he pushed a freight car up an incline. An-

other time he lifted a brick. And lifting this mere brick he strained himself so badly that he is now partly paralyzed and in danger of dying.

The story goes this way:

Whitman was a professional strong man when Weber and Fields were tickling this country's sense of humor with their guttural mirth. He toured with them as an added attraction of the show, and it was part of every night's work to toy with weights and dumbbells of 500 pounds or so.

Later he went into the New York police department and earned several citations for bravety, displayed mainly in halting runaway horses. They used horses on the streets of New York in those days and the runaway horse was the heroic policeman's handy opportunity to win a medal.

Five years ago Ajax retired and got a job as special policeman in the Irving Bank-Columbia Trust Company. It was an easy job. Sometimes they had to unload shipments of gold in brick or pig form, but that was mere play for Ajax who had lifted the 1,000 pound dumbbell.

Last July they were unloading a shipment at the bank and Ajax as usual was helping. He stooped to pick up a gold brick, something snapped and Ajax, the mighty man, collapsed, beaten by a mere brick of gold.

RUST - RESISTANCE WHEAT DOUBTFUL

Find Seems Almost Too Good

to be True, Declares Dr.

REGINA, Sask., Oct. 20—"I only hope it is true," was the comment of Dr. C. E. Saunders, discoverer of the famous Marquis wheat, on being shown the despatch from Winnipeg, announcing the discovery of the New Axminster wheat by Samuel Larcombe, for which almost perfect rust resistance is claimed.

"It seems almost too good to be true, however," he continued. "I should say there is a mistake somewhere in the report."

Dr. Saunders, who addressed the Canadian Club here today, pointed out that the new wheat was said to be the result of hybridizing seven times and that Mr. Larcombe started to develop it in 1916.
"Hybridizing seven times would take 21 years," the famous cerealist declared.

"It might be done in less, but it is extremely doubtful." "I know Mr. Larcombe very well," continued Dr. Saunders, "and I know he would not make a claim that was groundless, so I should say a mistake has been made."
