HIS COLLAR BONE BROKEN IN FALL

Harry W. Heans, of the pensions department of the local office of the D.S.C.R., suffered a fractured collar bone when he stumbled and fell on the Westfield Golf links on Saturday afternoon. The fracture is not a very serious one and he was reported last night to be resting comfortably at his summer home in Westfield. Mr. Heans was jumping across a ditch on the links and landed on a rock which swayed with his weight. He was thrown forward falling on his left shoulder and the collar bone was fractured.

As the result of a wound suffered in the world war Mr. Heans had lost one arm amputated, so that in this case, he was unable to break the force of his fall.

Medical care was given on the links by Dr. William Warwick and Dr. H. L. Abramson and Mr. Heans was rushed to the General Public Hospital for an X-ray examination. The X-ray plate showed the fracture to be no cause for alarm. While Mr. Heans will be laid up for some little while, his many friends are relieved to learn that his injury is not of a very grave nature.
