INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT NOVA SCOTIA

Settlers Arriving Last Year—Tourist Travel—Operation of Housing Act.
A report brought down in the Nova Scotia Legislature says:—
The number of settlers entering Nova Scotia during the year was 1,654. The bulk of these, namely 1,087, came from other British possessions and 864 from U. S. A. It is shown that the principal decline in immigration to this Province compared with pre-war days is due to the stoppage of the flow from foreign countries. Immigration from the British Isles has remained fairly steady.

The settlers of whom the Department has particular information number 484. The majority of these came from the British Isles, with a few from Holland, Norway, Sweden and Denmark, and are classed as farmers, farm laborers and domestics.
It is difficult to secure information as to the resources of each settler. Three hundred newcomers disclosed capital to the extent of \$127,870, and the total capital brought in by settlers is conservatively estimated at \$220,000.

Under present conditions it is essential to have a situation ready for every settler coming to Nova Scotia. The difficulty is that farmers generally do not feel they can give advance notice of their requirements. There were 482 placements made in farming districts. Progress has been made towards obtaining a complete survey of the resources of Nova Scotia. During the past summer a survey was made of a tract of land in Digby County, which was thought might be settled by a class of settler content to pioneer. The report is not yet available.

The increase of our tourist trade is engaging the attention of the Department. An up-to-date motorist map is in the course of preparation, and the expenditure of an advertising campaign being laid. The establishment of a National Park is related to the subject of tourists.
During the year the Housing Act was adopted by Middleton Hanport and brought into operation in Sydney and Glace Bay. Further allocations of Housing money have been made totaling \$419,000, making the total to September 30th, 1922, \$1,267,460. Up to that date 308 houses were erected in the Province, with the average loan thereon ranging from \$3,100 to \$3,858.

For the fiscal year the administration of the Housing Act involved an expenditure of \$547,448.50, making a total of \$1,121,281. Collections made by the Department from Commissions totaled \$86,880.92.

Wildwood, N. J., March 7.—Frederick Ellinger, former telephone lineman, who is alleged to have shot and killed Mrs. Emma McKewen as she was nursing her baby at her home, at 148 Schellenger Avenue, was held on a charge of murder this week.
Detective Unfreed said that Ellinger, who was a former boarder in the McKewen home, had told him that he was in love with Mrs. McKewen. He admitted shooting her, when he was arrested yesterday, the police said. The detective said that Ellinger told him the matter had been preying on his mind for six weeks, during which time he had gone to a Christian Science church in an effort to get cured of the worry and nervousness.
