

London, Júly 20-Baron Hayashi, Japanese ambassador, denies that there is Japan to President Harding's proposal for a conference at Washington, which, on the contrary, he said, was wel-welcomed. Japan was quite ready to dis-cuss with other powers questions of mu-tual interests, including the limitation of armaments, on which the Japanese gov-ernment has already expressed its will-ingness to negotiate.
