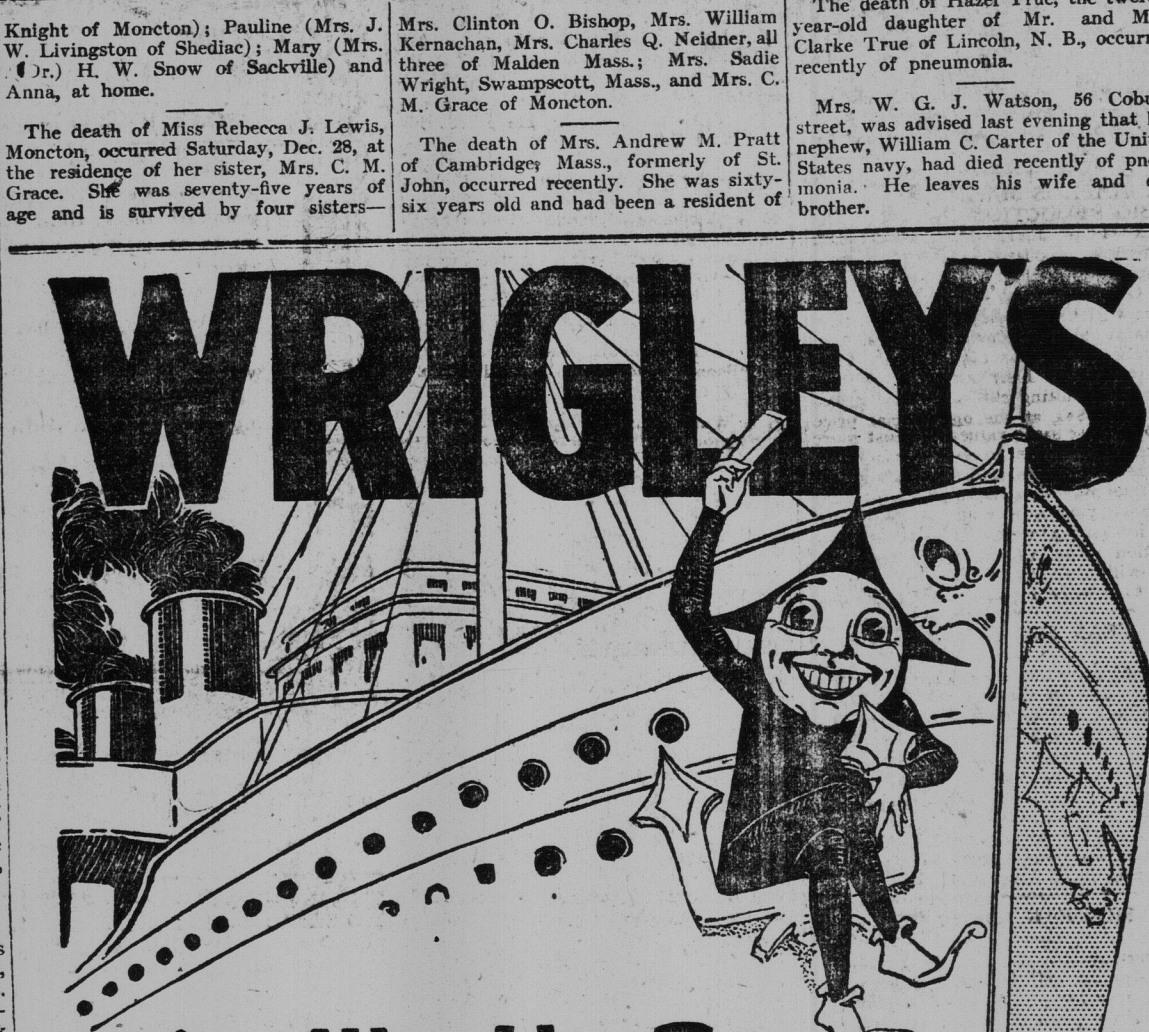
Mrs. George Ladd, of Upper Manger-

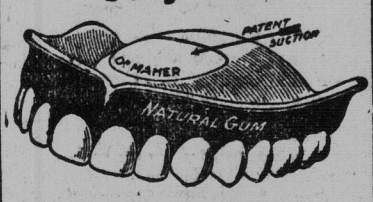

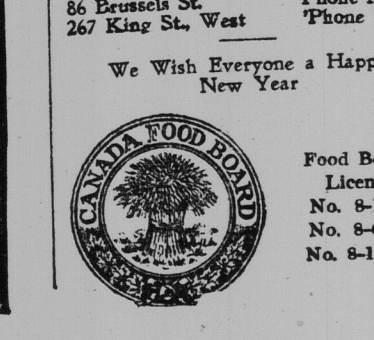

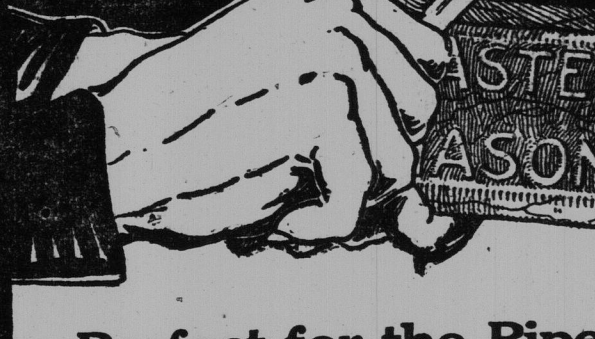
