LETTER CARRIERS IN CONVENTION

Hamilton, Ont., Sept. 6.—At today's session of the convention of the Federated Letter Carriers of Canada considerable discussion was aroused by the reading of a communication from the civil service employees, asking the support of the meeting in the case of Judge Morrison, who claimed exemption from income tax on the ground of being a government employee. Various speakers thought they should not try to evade the question, but pay like all other working people. No action was taken. President MacDonald scored the action of the clerks whom he claimed had gone behind the backs of the carriers and attempted to cut their throats. It should not be necessary for the carriers to beg the clerks to come in. Pierre Minard, of Montreal, was also opposed to going to the clerks. A similar feeling was said to exist in Toronto. The vote to adopt the executive report re affiliation carried 84 to 17 on divisions. The convention approved the amendment that temporary carriers be placed in the same basis as permanent men on annual increments and holidays. The government, among other things, will be asked to abolish the cap cover, mackintosh leggings, and provide southwester hats, longer capes than at present, and higher and closer fitting collars, waterproof overalls, all of which would give better protection to the mail and be more comfortable. On request of the porters of Toronto, an annual issue of boots and overalls was added to the request.

NEW BRUNSWICK POWER COMPANY

Interim Order of Commission Appointed Under Provisions of "An Act to Appoint a Commission in the Matter of the New Brunswick Power Company."

It appearing to the commission, in the course of its investigation and inquiry, to be justifiable and necessary for the financial temporary relief of the company to adjust and allow rates of fare for transportation and to fix the maximum price to be charged for gas and the maximum rate for electric energy, the commission makes the following interim order, as of August 27, 1918:

1. That as of the first day of October, 1918, and thereafter until the further order of the commission, the maximum lighting rates shall be as follows: First 500 kwh. per month ..... 15c. Next 500 kwh. per month ..... 12c. Next 500 kwh. per month ..... 10c. Over 500 kwh. per month ..... 7c.

2. That as of the said date, and thereafter until the further order of the commission, the maximum power rates shall be as follows: First 200 kwh. per month ..... 12c. Next 200 kwh. per month ..... 8c. Next 200 kwh. per month ..... 5c. Next 1,000 kwh. per month ..... 4c. Next 8,000 kwh. per month ..... 2c. Over 8,000 kwh. per month ..... 1c.

3. That as of the said date, and thereafter until the further order of the commission, the maximum rate for gas, both fuel and lighting, shall be 22 per 1,000 feet.

4. That as of the said date, and thereafter until the further order of the commission, the street railway fare shall be 6 cents. The Company shall not be required to issue tickets. Transfer of passengers shall remain in force without change. Outstanding tickets shall not be valid for fares after said date but shall be redeemed in cash on demand at Company's office.

INCREASE IN ANIMAL PRODUCTS

Notwithstanding the difficulties of labor, and the consequent shortage of food, Canada's total animal exports of all descriptions and from all sources have increased since 1913 from \$29,704,123 in that year to \$142,946,181 in 1917. The increase in our exports of cattle and cattle products has been from \$2,406,052 in 1913 to \$27,655,817 in 1917; in sheep and sheep products from \$487,544 in 1913 to \$2,054,548 in 1917; in swine and pig products from \$5,764,909 in 1913 to \$26,134,475 in 1917; in poultry and poultry products from \$16,462 in 1913 to \$2,075,990 in 1917, and in dairy produce from \$20,979,971 in 1913 to \$86,884,295 in 1917.—H. S. Arkell, in Farmers' Advocate.

that certain concessions may be effected in operation, which, however, cannot be made effective in time to assist in meeting the present emergency. The Commission requires, however, the Company to make no further payment of salaries to the Executive Committee, or to officers not connected with operation while this order remains in effect. The Commission recommends to the Company that it make an immediate study of the question of more satisfactory as well as more economical routing of cars, and that it put in operation a sufficient number of one-man cars to determine their economical value and suitability for the service.

It is not within the authority of the Commission to amend the contract for municipal lighting. It does, however, recommend to the City of St. John that it consent to such an amendment to that the price under the contract shall be increased 25 per cent.
