FREDERICTON STUDENT IS DEAD IN HOSPITAL

Joseph Alexander Succumbs to Typhoid - John P. Hudson Dead in Brooklyn

Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 27 - Joseph F. Alexander, of the junior class, died in the Victoria Hospital this morning after a few days' illness from typhoid fever. He was a son of John L. Alexander, of Fredericton Junction, and was aged twenty-three. He was a bright student, popular with his associates, and his death has occasioned great regret. The body will be taken to the Junction this afternoon for interment. Service will be conducted by Rev. Dr. MacDonald in Brunswick Street Baptist church, and will be attended by the student body.

LETTER OF THANKS TO DYNAMITERS FROM UNION OFFICIAL

Indianapolis, Nov. 27 - Senator John W. Kern, counsel for the defence, continued the "Dynamite" case, and the cross examination of Orrie E. McManis.

In his direct testimony McManis named fifteen of the defendants as having helped him directly or indirectly, in arranging explosives. Senator Kern sought to bring out that the defendants met the dynamite merely by accident because of their being members of the Iron Workers' Union.

The witness insisted that proposed explosives were talked of by union officials in various cities. In one instance a defendant was named by McManis without having been seen by him. McManis said on returning to Indianapolis after blowing up a job at Superior, Wis., in August, 1910 that J. J. McNamara, "a letter of thanks for the dynamite" visit to Superior," had been received from Fred Moore, business agent at Duluth, Minn.

THE BAPTIST MINISTERS TO ENTERTAIN CANADIANS

The members of the various boards of trade who will go to Europe on the Canadian trade mission early in the new year, are likely to have an enjoyable as well as a profitable trip. Arrangements are already being made for their entertainment on the other side and several invitations of festivities in their honor have been received.

A. M. Beck, editor-in-chief of the Canadian News, London, Eng., has written asking for the privilege of entertaining the delegates at a banquet which they are in London. The International Commercial Intelligence Bureau of Amsterdam has also written offering the use of its offices in various parts of Europe and promising co-operation. Lord Strathcona, through his secretary, has asked for further information regarding the time they will be in England, in order that he may make his plans accordingly.

BRITISH BYE-ELECTION

London, Nov. 27 - The bye-election at Bow and Bromley, brought about by the resignation of Lansbury, resulted as follows:

Blair, Unionist, 4,012; Lansbury, suffragist, 3,829; Unionist majority, 183.

The figures at the last general election were: Lansbury, Labor, 4,315; Amery, Unionist, 3,482; labor majority, 833.

The Liberal party ran no candidate, advising their adherents to abstain from voting. The suffragettes worked hard for their candidate throughout the campaign.

Lansbury resigned because he wanted a straight fight on the question of woman suffrage, but owing to many other issues which were introduced into the election, the result cannot be accepted as a reliable criterion of the views of the constituency regarding votes for women.

PREACHING BEFORE THE SOVEREIGN

(London Tit-Bits)

I have had the honor of preaching before three of our sovereigns, said a well-known clergyman, and I can assure you I have never found any duty more pleasant. Nervous? Well, I must admit I had a big attack of nerves the first time I preached before the sovereign.

I shall never forget the day on which I received my first command to preach before Queen Victoria, when she was not aware that Queen Victoria even knew this honor is for the most part confined to the royal chaplains, a select and august body from which I was removed as from the state. However, it seems that Her Majesty had read a very kind and gracious prologue to me, and she was quite unthought and quite unprepared.

At Balmoral

So, on the Saturday before the day of Balmoral, I was invited to preach before the sovereign, and I was not a little surprised to find that I was to preach before Queen Victoria, when she was not aware that Queen Victoria even knew this honor is for the most part confined to the royal chaplains, a select and august body from which I was removed as from the state. However, it seems that Her Majesty had read a very kind and gracious prologue to me, and she was quite unthought and quite unprepared.

Our late king was a perfect miracle of punctuality. He always entered the church almost to the second, and he followed the service with the closest attention. I could hardly tell her responses quite distinctly among all the others in the crowded church, and I can still distinctly hear his voice above the rest as he sang one of his favorite hymns, such as "Onward, Christian Soldiers."

King George's Confession

An King George is just as devout and punctilious as his royal father. When he is at Balmoral he not only attends the Church every Sunday, but expects all his guests to do the same. As a rule, he drives from the castle in a landau drawn by two greys and preceded by an outrider, and he wears Highland dress, as becomes the king of Scotland. His guests ride or walk as they please. He, too, is the soul of punctuality and reverence, and, like his father, he has a marked partiality for short sermons.

The last time I preached before him he said, when thanking me for my services: "Do you know, Mr. —, I behaved very badly when I heard your first sermon a good many years ago. I was guilty of the grave impropriety of falling asleep, and had been to some when my brother gave me a timely dig in the ribs. I hope I am behaving better now!"

KILLS SUFFERING WIFE AT HER OWN REQUEST

Paris, Nov. 27 - M. Beguery, a sexagenarian former procureur de la republique at Avies, whose wife had suffered from the agonies of an incurable malady, yielded to her obdurate requests, and killed her with three revolver shots. Husband and wife were very much attached, but her sufferings made the wife twice attempt to commit suicide. M. Beguery surrendered to the police after he had ended his wife's sufferings.

The sister of the wife arrived at the station-house soon after, and exclaimed: "Beguery, you are a saint. I know what she suffered for a year and what you endured. Madame Beguery's sufferings had made her husband a neurotic, so much so that his friends feared for his reason."
