RAMSAY'S DRIVE WINS FOR GREEKS

He had the Lynn team on the run all the way and was given great support by his team-mates. The credit for winning the game is equally divided, but to Eddie Ramsay a special bouquet is due. With three on base in the eighth inning he hit a slaking two-bagger to deep centre and cleaned up the base. The score at the time had been 1 to 0 in favor of the visitors.

Waller pitched a great game for the Lynn team, and had it not been for the eighth he would very likely have pitched a shut-out game. Terry McGovern at first, and Joe Neptune at shortstop, two favorites, played good ball. Bill Harrington did not have the class that his brother Frank has been playing in this season, striking out three times out of four times up. The Lynn team as a whole, are good steady players, especially their outfield, but the field also play first-class ball.
