Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

ANY Person who is the sole head of a family or any made over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. This right must appear in person at the Dominion Lands office, or the Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months residence upon actual cultivation of the land in a h. of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section along the homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon a homesteaded or pre-emption six months at each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to cultivate a homesteaded or pre-emption six months at each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00. A homesteader who has exhausted his homesteaded right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$12.00 per acre.
