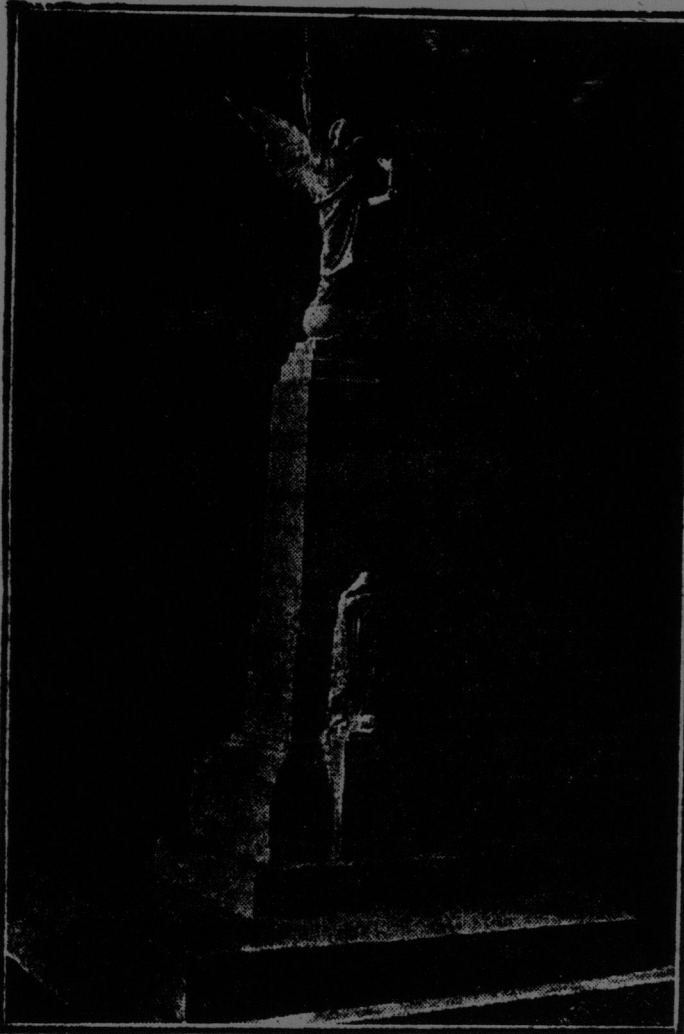


"LEST WE FORGET"

TORONTO TRIBUTE TO CANON KUHRING

(Toronto Globe.)

Rev. Canon Kuhring died on Monday at his home, 59 Howard street, after an illness of three or four months.

Rev. Gustav A. Kuhring of St. Alban's Cathedral and late Canon of the Diocese of Fredericton and Chaplain in the C. E. F., was born in the City of Quebec in 1880. He served his Creator in the days of his youth, beginning work in the Anglican Church in that city at an early age. Later he joined the staff of the Y. M. C. A., under whose auspices he spent nine fruitful years in Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa, leading up to the Christian ministry, to which he was ordained by the late Archbishop Sweetman on his graduation from Wycliffe College, Toronto, in 1901. He served for a time under Canon Dumoulin in St. James' Cathedral and was curate for some years under Rev. Septimus Jones at the Church of the Redeemer, at the same time becoming Dean in Residence of Wycliffe College.

In 1905 he succeeded Rev. Henry Grasset Baldwin as rector of the Church of the Ascension and was called from a very happy service there to St. John's Church, St. John, N. B., in 1905. After fifteen years of useful service he returned to Toronto last year to join the staff of the Bishop of Toronto for social service work in this city in connection with the jail and prison farms. During his ministerial life he held many important positions on various boards and committees and was especially interested in the inception of the Church of England Deaconess House, and, with Mr. Golden Smith, in the organization of the Associated Charities of Toronto in 1906, serving as its first chairman.

He took a high position in the representative gatherings of his church, and, besides going to England with a deputation from Wycliffe College in 1909, he was sent as a delegate from the Canadian Church to the great Pan-Anglican Conference in 1908.

He was noted as a successful and attractive Bible class teacher and continuously for many years he gathered large bodies of men together for the serious study of the Bible.

His simple and devoted Christian life and his genial and affectionate temperament drew to him friends from all conditions of life by whom he was much beloved and will be deeply mourned.

FREE TREATMENT OF TUBERCULOSIS FOR RETURNED MEN

This is Urged in Red Cross Resolution — Report on Memorial Workshop — Sympathy Extended to Miss Kuhring.

A resolution urging the Dominion government to give free treatment to returned soldiers suffering with tuberculosis as a just recognition of their services and as a means of preventing the spread of the disease was passed yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the New Brunswick division of the Red Cross. Mrs. George F. Smith presided.

E. A. Schofield reported for the advisory committee on the Red Cross workshops. He told of changes made in the former Memorial Workshops and of the plans for still further improvements. It was now practically supporting. A proper place to carry on the work was a necessity, he said, for the realization of their aim, to give work to the thirty-two men on the list now.

A letter from Mount Allison University asked for Red Cross literature to be used as text books. Mrs. F. H. Ellis read the hospital committee report. The report of the sewing committee was read.

Miss Tremaine read the report for the past committee, telling of 69 infants and 1771 women being cared for, six cases treated and seventy-one follow-up cards being sent. The public health nurses' report, sent forward by Miss H. T. McKeljohn, told of 895 visits, 282 child welfare and 610 nursing; 600 school children had been examined, twenty-two health talks given and twenty-five health classes held in the city. The work of the nurses at St. Stephen, Campbellton, Shediac, McAdam, Minto, Rexton, Sussex, and Canterbury was included in the report.

A resolution was passed extending sympathy to Mrs. G. A. Kuhring. Miss Ethel Jarvis read her report as secretary. It told of a copy of reports and the membership of the committee to headquarters. New Brunswick now has the fourth largest membership in the Dominion. The annual meeting will be held in Toronto in April. A total of 289 relief articles had been sent to various institutions.

The report of the treasurer, C. B. Allan, told of total receipts for the month of \$908.80; expenditures of \$925.98 including public health nurses, \$381.74; depot, \$269.33; Junior Red Cross, \$160.28; post committee, \$14; recreation hut, \$10; campaign, \$12.67; and medical clinics, \$3.60. The balance was \$5,181.54.

The Junior Red Cross report given by Mrs. Harold Lawrence told of thirty-eight branches having been formed with a membership of 1,321. The disabled children's fund totalled \$79.80 and the capital account amounted to \$54.80. The disabled children's fund had been drawn on to care for the first case, a child with a twisted neck, who had been successfully treated at a cost of \$90.95. Referring to the varied and splendid activities of the juniors, Mrs. Lawrence told of one branch adopting a poor child whose case had been brought forward by the Soldier Settlement Home department. Another branch had made a quilt for the Children's Aid, dressing gowns and comforts had been given to the Anti-Tuberculosis Society and twelve branches had made 250 valentines that were sent to the soldiers in hospital and to each of the hospitals in the province where children were cared for. Two children had been enrolled as individual members. Mrs. Lawrence said in conclusion that it was hoped to have the June issue of the Bulletin a Junior Red Cross number. Authority was given the finance committee to arrange to send a Junior

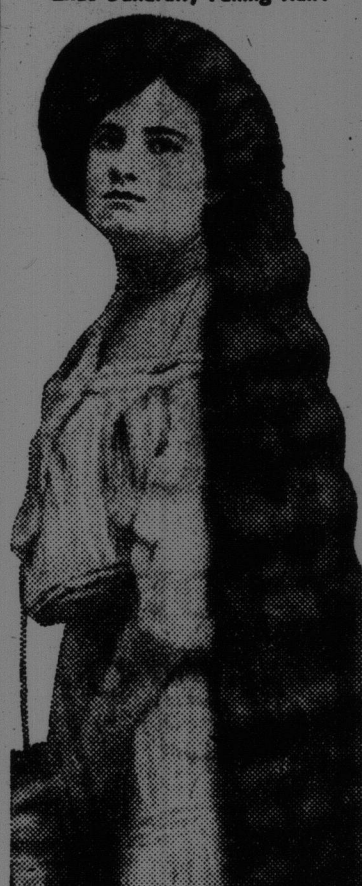

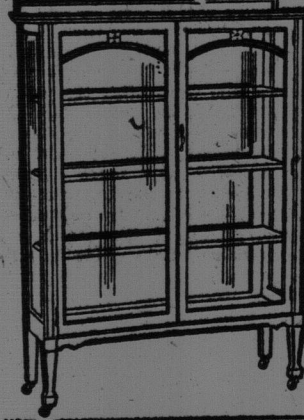

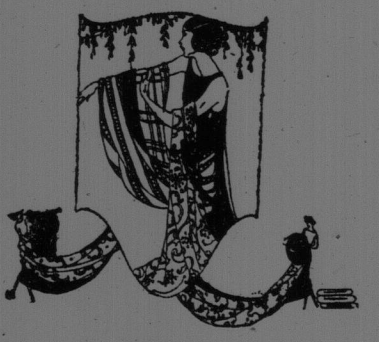
