DEATH TO THE ENGLISH

That Was the Cry of the Mob in the Streets of Candia.

NOW GREAT BRITAIN PROPOSES TO LAND TROOPS, EXPEL THE TURKS AND PUBLICLY HANG THE RINGLEADERS.

Athens, Sept. 9.—The Asy says it learns from an authentic source that "as soon as the British troops arrive at Candia from Malta, the Turkish garrison in Candia will be expelled, martial law proclaimed, and the ringleaders of the riots put on trial and publicly hanged, if guilty." According to a dispatch from Candia, sent last evening, the admirals of the international fleet have decided to compel the disarming of the Bashi-Bazouks and the surrender of the instigators of the disorders.

DEATH TO THE ENGLISH.

London, Sept. 9.—The correspondent of the Times at Candia, telegraphing Thursday, says: "It is estimated that no fewer than 300 Christians have been massacred and the town pillaged by Bashi-Bazouks and the Turkish soldiers. All reports agree as to the disgraceful behavior of the Turkish troops, who were seen firing on Col. Reid. The mob ran through the streets shouting, 'Death to the English!' Part of the town is still burning."

GHASTLY STORIES.

London, Sept. 9.—The correspondent of the Standard, telegraphing Thursday, from the British battleship Camperdown, off Candia, says: "The refugees tell ghastly stories of massacre."

THE CABLE NEWS.

Conservatives are Holding Their Own in Ireland.

The Stars and Stripes Raised Beside the Royal Standard—Cable Notes.

London, Sept. 9.—In the election yesterday, in the North Division of the County Down, for a successor in Parliament to the late Col. T. Warren (Conservative), who was returned without opposition at the last election, J. B. Houston (Conservative) was returned with a majority of 300.

SURPRISED 'EM.

The Stars and Stripes was raised with the British Union Jack and the Royal Standard on the marquee erected on Salisbury plain during the march past of the troops at the end of the army manoeuvres, as a compliment to the American representatives present. The foreign military attaches seemed to be surprised at the sight of the American flag.

'CYCLE TRADE DEPRESSED.

The depression in the cycle trade deepens with the advance of the year. In Birmingham there are between 2,000 and 3,000 men out of employment. At Redditch alone one firm has just suspended 400 hands. The cause of the depression is given as over-production and German competition. The rush of a year or two ago was unhealthy, and trade is now finding its level. It is thought that after the show in November more will be done.

CABLE NOTES.

The English Government will probably adopt a state telephone system.

They report that no fewer than 700 Christians are missing. Several attempts were made last night to set on fire the office of the Eastern Telegraph Company. It has been ascertained that all the houses overlooking the British camp were loop-holed for rifle fire, and barricaded. Every Christian survivor of the massacre swears that the butchery was mostly the work of Turkish soldiers, who first robbed and then slew their victims. Edhem Pasha is the one who ought to be held primarily responsible.

ORDER RESTORED.

Candia, Island of Crete, Sept. 9.—A detachment of international troops which has just arrived here has occupied the fortifications and restored order. The Mussulmans took care of the Christians placed under their care, but they did not attempt to prevent the destruction of Christian houses till the international troops arrived.

BASHI—BAZOUK EXCESSES.

Athens, Sept. 9.—The following despatch, dated at 8 o'clock last evening, has been received from Candia: "The Bashi-Bazouks are committing excesses and the Christians in the surrounding districts are arming to march to the aid of the Candians. There are eight warships in the harbor, and a fresh bombardment is expected. The British, German and Spanish consulates have been looted, and thus far three hundred captive Christians and sixty-seven British subjects have been killed."

The loss by the coal mine strike in Wales was \$31,000,000. Frank Holmes tried to swim the English channel. He went 24 miles, but when six miles off the French coast fog made him desist.

SETTLED A REVOLUTION.

Prompt Action of a Britisher in Acapulco Has Good Results.

San Francisco, Sept. 9.—The U. S. S. Albatross has arrived in port, twelve days from Acapulco. She left here a short time ago, bound for Cocos, where Capt. Curtis was ordered to protect the interests of American citizens. A few days after the Albatross sailed from here the British gunboat Leander had reached Cocos, and by prompt action her captain not only adjusted the rights of both British and American citizens, but practically wound up the revolution.

ENGLISH CRICKETERS LEAD.

Montreal, September 8.—There was only a sprinkling of spectators to witness the cricket match between P. V. Warner's English eleven and a team representing Montreal and district, though the attendance was larger in the afternoon. The weather was pleasant. The wicket was soft, but improved as the day wore on. The playing was not brilliant. The Englishmen went first to bat and shortly after lunch were retired for 130 runs. The Canadians were retired for 82 runs.
