

BOY MURDERED IN OPEN STREET

Shot to Death in Chicago's
Business Centre.
Nobody Saw the Shot Fired—
Woman Who Was With Him
Shortly Before is Suspected

CHICAGO, Nov. 28—George Reynolds, sixteen years old, son of Captain Peter Reynolds, of the St. Louis police department, was murdered on a street near the business district of the city today. Following the sound of pistol shots, his body was picked up near the sidewalk in an unconscious condition by the driver of a newspaper delivery wagon. Reynolds revived and gasped, "I have been shot in the mouth." He

carried to a police station, where he died as he was being lifted to a hospital ambulance. Detectives are working on the theory that a woman is concerned in the young man's death. It was said Reynolds was with a young woman shortly before his death.

Reynolds came to Chicago, from St. Louis a few weeks ago to take a position at the Majestic Hotel. He resigned, however, Thanksgiving Day and the hotel management know nothing of him.
